In the event of my death I declare the following to be my Will, I Vest my whole Estate, Real & Personal & mixed in John Roman & James Alled, and the survivor of them, And in such trustees as such survivor shall appoint by Deed or will And if they die without such appointment then Samuel Davers & Daniel Graf are my trustees, & the survivor of them, And whoever shall be appointed by such survivor by Deed or will The Estate is vested upon the following trusts - That they pay my debts, fulfill my Contracts, And have full powers over my Estate according to their Judgment, They shall permit my wife to use all my Personal & real Property she pleases, & they shall sell any of my lands, they find it necessary to sell for her support, and make title, whenever I ought to have made them, and when the sons of Mills and Davers, Samuel Davers and John Davers, have grown up, and settled to in a course of Business, that it is safe & prudent in the opinion of my s^d Representatives to give them their portions, that they are to divide my Estate in not more than three parts, and give it to such of my s^d Nephews as they deem worthy and promising, it being expressly my intention, that no Nephew whose morals, whose talents or whose ambition to be an eminent and distinguished Man, are

shall liable to suspicion shall have any share in my Estate. My s^d trustees may give my Estate entire to one, if they Judge best, Or to two, but not more than three at farthest - Provided that my Cornwall Estate, shall pass entire in one lot, to that Nephew most promising of all, and he shall take my Name, have my Golden Watch and my Arms. If the Execution of this Will devolves on Samuel Davers his son shall have no share. If my trustees perceive one of my Nephews to be a boy of such fine and promising talents, as they think would meet my full approbation, they are at liberty to and I request that they will supervise his Education, learn him the Latin thoroughly, also Geometry, and give him a Military Education: sending him to Europe for that purpose, if they see some safe Governor to send ^{him} with, I wish my scattered pieces of land to be disposed of, and the proceeds put to interest, leaving only my land in this County thome place in Fayette and the latter to be sold if my wife is living or at her death all written by me signed this 18th July 1811
