8 I give and bequeath unto my daughter Sophia Spurr one negro boy named Harry, also one feather bed and furniture and one cow and calf. And it is to be fully understood the legacies left in my will to my children namely Sary Capps, Swinnah Spurr, Elizabeth Wallinghams, Polly King, Ann Harris, Henry Cops and Lycia Spurr have been fully received by them.

9 I give and bequeath to my son John Wynn the tract of land lying also being at the Croft plains containing seventy acres be the same more or less which land I purchased of Robert Frank and also two negroes, namely Shackel and Hager one feather bed and furniture and one cow and calf. I give and bequeath to my

10 daughter Dorcha Young two negro gals named Jude and Samuel them and their increase to Dorcha and her heirs forever lawfully begotten of her body, also one horse bridle and saddle with one feather bed and furniture and one cow and calf.

11 I give and bequeath to my son Nathaniel Wynn the one half of the plantation I now live on at the death of his mother. Also two negroes, namely Rose and Pers and their increase forever one horse bridle and saddle and bed and furniture one cow and calf. I give and bequeath to my

12 daughter Barbary Wynn the remaining half of the plantation I now live on at the death of her mother, My meaning this plantation I now live on is that my son Nathaniel and daughter Barbary may have an equal division at the death of their father of all the land improvements in the plantation; I further give to my daughter Barbary three negroes, namely Moses, Ving and Clay them and their increase to Barbary and her heirs forever lawfully begotten of her body, also one horse bridle and saddle one feather bed and furniture, one cow and calf.

At witness it is presumed that my wife has an interest in some negroes in the possession of her father John Cotton

of Madison County to which in trust I conceive myself entitled or which claim I will and bequeath to my two sons John and Nathaniel Wynn. And further at the death of my wife

Mary Wynn it is my will that the whole of my estate in her hands may be equally divided amongst the whole of my children, and lastly it is my wish and desire that my wife Mary Wynn and my son John Wynn may act as Executors to this my last will and testament. In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal this 8th of September 1805

I Oliver Wain of the County Fayette and State of Kentucky being of a sound mind and memory but in a very low state of health do hereby certify that it is appointed unto all men one to die do make this my last will and testament in witness whereof I have subscribed my name and seal this 29th day of October 1805.

I give and bequeath to my beloved wife Mary Wain the plantation I now live on with all the farming utensils thereto belonging with all my household and kitchen furniture except what I shall hereafter bequeath, also five Negroes namely Abram Bob Milt Cumberland and Rachel and likewise one negro girl named Darcy during her natural life or widowhood.

I give and bequeath to my daughter Sarah Peggy one negro woman named Hannas and her increase to the said Sarah and her heirs forever lawfully begotten of her body, also one bed and furniture.

I give and bequeath to my daughter Savannah Spurr one negro girl named Agnes and her increase to the said Savannah and her heirs forever lawfully begotten of her body, also one feather bed and furniture and one cow and calf.

I give and bequeath to my daughter Elizabeth Waltham one negro boy named Pell also one feather bed and furniture and one cow and calf.

And whereas I gave to my daughter Polly King a negro girl named Fony and the amount of a feather bed and cow and calf, but inasmuch as my beloved daughter Polly King and girl I gave her have both departed this life and my said daughter leaving two children John and Jane King and for my love and affection to them, it is my will that at the death of my wife they shall have one horse each, the other mother has received her equal dividend.

I give and bequeath unto my daughter Jane Thomas one negro boy named John to her and her heirs forever lawfully begotten of her body, also one feather bed and furniture, and one cow and calf.

I give and bequeath unto my daughter Anna, one negro boy named James, also one feather bed and furniture, one cow and calf.
