In the name of God Amen I William Parrish
of Fayette County, being being sick and weak
in body, but of perfect mind and memory
I thank God, calling to mind the mortality
of my body, and knowing that it is appointed
for all men once to die, do make and ordain
this my last will and Testament, that is to say
Principally and first of all, I give and commend
my Soul unto God that gave it, and my body
to the earth, to be buried in a decent Christian burial
at the direction of my Executors: Hoping at the gene-
ral Resurrection, I shall receive the same again by
the Power of God. And as touching my worldly
estate, I give and dispose of the same in the following
Manner, First, I give to my Son Benjamin Parrish
One Dollar to him and his Heirs forever; Then I give
to my Son Jarruel Parrish one dollar to him and his
Heirs forever. Then I give to my wife Letitia one bed
and furniture ^{which she} she now makes use of, one cow
and calf her choice of my stock of cattle ten pounds
of wool, and all the cotton wool thread, that she has
already spun, which I consider a compensation for
her trouble, and attendance to me. Then my will and
desire is that all the rest of my estate be sold by my
executors and after my just debts are all paid that the
money be equally divided between the heirs of my son
Stephen Parrish Dec: and the heirs of my daughter
Ann Stanton Dec: Rebecca Parrish, William Parrish,
Leida Parrish, Lavonia Parrish, ^{My daughter & my son} Francis Stanton, each
me to receive their proportion as they marry or
become of age to them and their heirs forever, and lastly
I appoint my son Benjamin Parrish, and my trusty
friends James Ansell, and Saml. Ayres my executors of
this my last will and testament to be sworn unto

of the same state formerly managers of Washington
County Executors of this my last will and testament
I do hereby devise and bequeath to my said Executors
all my Estate, real and personal, whatsoever the same
may be. In trust for the following uses: In the
first place to convey to John Jordan Junr eleven
hundred and twenty five acres of land out of a
tract of ten thousand acres patented in my name
lying on Manns Runn Creek, opposite to Hartford,
the said Jordan being entitled to that quantity,
which is to be laid off in such a manner so that
the quantity shall be as nearly as can be equal to the
quality of the remainder. In the second place to discharge
all my just debts. And for that purpose I do
request my said Executors to make such dispositions of
my said estate, as to them shall seem most likely
likely to do justice to my Creditors, and at the
same time doing as little injury as possible to my
said Estate. And in the last place after the payment

head, sheep, and all the fowls on my place, one
beecan, six chairs, one half of all my pewter
& earthen ware, two plows and two sets of plow
gear, and all the salt mow in my possession,
one powdering tub, two barrels, and all the water
wheels, one wool wheel, one flax do, one check reel,
one saddle and bridle, forty yards of lincen now in
the house, one ax, two smoothing irons, and her choice
of one half dozen knives & forks, and one folding
table and one cupboard. Item I give and bequeath
unto my three last children (To wit) Nancy, Randal
& William, the following slaves (To wit) Doby,
Clary, & ~~and~~ ^{with all their future increase}
to be equally divided between them and their heirs
forever. Likewise two hundred dollars to be
paid out of my estate by my Executors and put out
on interest for the rearing of the said children
and to be applyed to that use in due time by said
Executors. Item I give and bequeath unto my beloved
daughter Jane one bed and furniture, one
horse, one cart, one cow, one sheep, one
chicken, one pig, one dog, one cat, one
chick.

one horse, one place wheel, one negro girl slave
named Shantel with three future increase to be paid
her heirs forever, likewise the remaining half of my
pewter & earthen ware, and the pot and oven
called his to be delivered unto her by demand of
my Executors. Item I give and bequeath
unto my beloved son George one bed and
furniture, and 1500 ^{to} Item I give and bequeath unto
my beloved children (To wit) James, William &
George one & Susannah Boon the following part
partly to be sold and divided between the four
equally (To wit) the remaining part of the land
whereon I now live, likewise one negro man slave
named Sary. Likewise all the surplus that may

is that my Executors call all my estate not here
in before said on twelve months credit after
the expiration of which time all the money
legacies herein before mentioned shall be on
demand except the one which is mentioned
