In the name of God Amos Williams of Fayette County in the State of Kentucky being sick of body but sound in memory thinks it his duty to give for the same as makes and perfect his my last will and testament in manner and form following that is to say I give and bequeath unto my wife Rachel Fry my negro woman named Cook and her daughter four my roan mare three cows four two hunting saw eight barrels all the pieces with all my household furniture the fourth of all the crops raised on the land which I give to my son Jacob or Charles one third of the proceeds and appertain

grow on the said land and my dwelling house the proceeds to be sufficient passage to the public roads the house and appertainances to be hers during her life I also will and ordain my good and lawful share in an acre of free for her yearly and that she shall have a convenient stable built for her at the joint expence of all my sons I also will ordain that she maintain and support my three youngest daughter Rebecca Elizabeth and Catherine Fry till they be of age I also will that my wife Rachel and my son Jacob do cause my three said youngest daughters to be taught to their joint expence reading writing and arithmetic as much as customary I also will that the goods and chattels already given to my children shall remain to them as their own and further will that my debts be paid out of the monies and debts due to my estate but if they should not be sufficient that each of my children shall contribute equally to their discharge but if there should be a surplus it shall be divided between my wife and children giving her two shares I further give and bequeath to my son Joseph Fry one acre of plow land one acre of gear, for two horses, and one greibing horse further give and bequeath unto my daughter Rebecca Fry five mares, two cows and calves, four sheep, which I ordain my son Jacob shall give out of his bequeath, also one heifer and pig, with bedding, which my wife Rachel will furnish, and twelve pewter plates, two dishes, two basons, and six spoons, six knives, and forks, one iron pot, one soddy, and bread, they to be furnished by my wife and son Jacob jointly I further give and bequeath to my daughters Elizabeth and Catherine Fry, each equal in every article with my daughter Rebecca.

I also will and ordain that my wife Rachel and son Jacob shall pay the said legacies to my daughters, as they severally come of age, or when they are married, save to my son Jacob Fry.

I give and bequeath, my boy named Tom, and the remainder of my estate goods and chattels whatsoever, I further give and devise unto my son James Fry his heirs and assigns forever, that part of the tract of land purchased from Robert Johnson by me on the waters of Old horse in Fayette County, in the State of Kentucky, which was laid off for him, and on which he now lives containing one hundred and fifty two acres, plus or
