in body, but of perfect mind and memory
I thank God, calling to mind the mortality
of my body, and knowing that it is appointed
for all men once to die, do make and ordain
this my last will and Testament, that is to say
Principally and first of all, I give and commend
my soul unto God that gave it, and my body
to the earth, to be buried in a decent Christian burial
at the direction of my Executors: Hoping at the gene-
ral Resurrection, I shall receive the same again by
the Power of God. And as touching my worldly
estate, I give and dispose of the same in the following
manner, First, I give to my son Benjamin Parrish
One Dollar to him and his heirs forever; then I give
to my son Jarruel Parrish one dollar to him and his
heirs forever. then I give to my wife Letitia one feather bed
and furniture ^{with} the new make use of, one cow
and calf her choice of my stock of cattle ten pounds
of wool, and all the cotton wool thread, that she has
already spun, which I consider a compensation for
her trouble, and attendance to me, then my will and
desire is that all the rest of my estate be sold by my
executors and after my just debts are all paid that the
money be equally divided between the heirs of my son
Stephen Parrish Dec: and the heirs of my daughter
Ann Stanton Dec: Rebecca Parrish, William Parrish,
Leida Parrish, Lavonia Parrish, ^{My daughter & my son} Francis Stanton, each
me to receive their proportion as they marry or
become of age to them and their heirs forever, and lastly
I appoint my son Benjamin Parrish, and my trusty
friends James Ansell, and Saml. Ayres my executors of
this my last will and testament to be sworn unto

I have hereunto set my hand and seal this 18 day
of July in the year of our Lord one thousand eight
hundred and eight, William Parrish (read)
