Thomas arrived near the mouth of Tuckey and a negro man  
by name of London and a negro woman by name of Blonny and some  
furniture worth of horses to be valued to him by some trusted persons and  
a feather bed and furniture and my interest in the mill to him  
and his heirs forever. Then I give unto my son Abner Young the  
one equal half of the quantity of acres of land left in my hand  
after the two hundred acres is taken off for my son Colby to include  
my said son Abner Youngs plantation where he now lives and to  
be laid off in as good a form as the situation of the said tract  
will admit of so as to do as little injury to the remaining part as  
possible and a negro man by name of Ned and a negro woman  
by name of Lucy to him and his heirs forever. Then I give unto  
my son John Young the plantation and tollance of land  
wherein I now live all except that heretofore given only reserving  
to myself during her life one equal half of all the clear land  
and my manor house and a sufficiency of timber for her support  
and use and after her death the whole of it my son John to have  
and I give unto my son John Young a negro woman by name of Anne  
and a child by name of Lily and a negro boy by name of Sack  
and seventy pounds worth of horses to be valued by some trusted men  
and a feather bed to him and his heirs forever. Then I give  
and bequeath unto my daughter Jemmy Harrison a negro boy by name  
of Will and a negro woman by name of Melly and a feather  
bed and a negro girl by name of Bay and the equal of the land  
I got of Thomas Carnant so whatever the hundred and one of land  
I got to from my son Andrew Young which I got out of  
my said son Andrew Youngs legacy to him and his heirs  
forever and two hundred dollars which I have heretofore given  
her to be and his heirs forever. Then I stand unto my  
daughter Jemmy Harrison and her heirs the one equal half

of the tract of land devised to my son John Young to include  
my manor house and after his decease to go to my said John  
Young. I also lend unto my beloved wife a negro man by name  
of Frederick and a boy by name of Charles and a woman by  
name of Ann and a girl by name of Lilla and one third of all  
my household and kitchen furniture and the one third of all  
my plantation tools and the one third of all my stock of every  
kind after taking out what is heretofore given in this my will  
all of which I lend unto my beloved wife during her natural  
life and after her death to be equally divided between  
Abner Young Andrew Young Jemmy Harrison John Young and  
Colby Young them and their heirs forever. Then it is my will  
and desire that Mary Whistday have out of my estate a house  
or more worth fifteen pounds which I give to her and her heirs  
forever. Then it is my will and desire that all my estate that  
is not heretofore devised in this will be equally divided between  
Abner Young Andrew Young John Young Colby Young  
and Jemmy Harrison and the children of my daughter Nancy  
Procter to receive their said Mothers equal part as one legatee  
to be equally divided between them my said grand children John  
Procter Charles and Colby Procter them and their heirs forever.  
Then it is my will and desire if either of my children die without  
lawfull heirs that their part of my estate be equally divided  
between all my then living children them and their heirs  
forever. Lastly I constitute and appoint my son Abner Young  
and Andrew Young and Hephiah Harrison executors of this  
my last will and testament ratifying this and no other to be  
my last will and testament all other wills by me heretofore  
made ratifying this and no other to be my last will and
