We the subscribers do certify that we were at Mr. Starks Lillians
 and in the room where he lay sick on the 20th day of last April
 when he expressed a belief that he should die and also advised
 to settle his affairs and dispose of his estate before his death
 and no person being present that he chose to write his will and
 after enquiring who was in the room, began and mentioned that
 he wanted his estate left or disposed of which is as follows
 in substance the not exactly the very words in which he spoke
 he said that each of his children was to have a negro & to be
 made of equal value when his children came of age or when
 married, we understood from him the negro he mentioned
 was his being one each of his children was to have a horse
 that is the same that is called there at this time, his son &
 daughter Stacey each to have a saddle he said he wanted
 Mr Henry Payne to exchange his negro male alien which we
 understood was to be exchanged for other negroes, and further said
 that the rest of his estate should remain in the possession of
 his wife for her support and the support of his children
 and that it should be kept together and not sold we have
 now stated as nearly the words and his meaning as we could
 which was spoken two days before his death and we further
 say that it was our opinion that he was fully in his senses
 at the time he spoke what is written above and clear to our own
eyes that ^{he} wished to be complied with as his last will, the
