In the name of God amen I Thomas Bateman of the County of Fleming State of Kentucky being weak in body but in perfect mind and memory blessed be Almighty God for the same, do make and publish this my last will and testament in the manner & form following that is to say First after paying all my debts and costs that may accrue on settling my estate I give devise

and bequeaths to my beloved wife Susanna Bateman all my estate both real and personal during her life-ly real estate consist in a tract of land on which I have five being part of John Cowan's and Robert Campbell's claims for which I hold obligations on said Cowan & Campbell's deed and it is my desire and bequest that my daughter Sarah Bateman and grandson Thomas Bateman that now lives with me shall live with my said beloved wife to her death if they should be the longest lived I also desire and bequeaths that my Executor or Executors to this my last will and testament shall cause a deed of my said land to be made to them or either of them if there should be but one from said John Cowan or his representatives and from said Joseph Woodhouse's representative, so soon as convenient and at least before sale of my said land is made, and to be made agreeable to my said obligations, and I further give and bequeaths to my said beloved wife all the property that she brought with her when she came with me which consist of one cow and calf, one bed & bedding, two flax wheels, one of them very old, two pewter plates, one half gallon pewter basin, four new iron vessels or stoves an eight seven, ten or four hundred. Five hives & forks. One earthen plate, two hogs one tea kettle and pickling tub, two waded buckets and four earthen crocks to her and her use forever and I further devise & bequeaths that my Executor shall as soon as convenient after my said beloved wife's death sell my said land and all the ballance of my goods and chattels that shall remain yet on hand on such terms as they may think most advantageous to my legacies and after paying all necessary expenses the ballance of the money to be paid over by my Executor or Executors in the following manner to my daughter Sarah Bateman

Forty one and one fourth out as her full share of all my estate To my daughter Sarah Bateman Seventeen pounds Kentucky currency, being the amount of one third of John Felt's estate that I got and my said daughter's mother when I married her.

And the one seventh of the balance I give and bequeath to each of my sons that is to John William Theobald Bateman and to each of my daughters that is to Mary Elly Sarah Bateman one seventh of said balance of my estate & to my grandson Thomas Bateman Theobaldson one seventh of said balance And one third of one seventh of said balance to each of Newton Bateman deceased's three children, that is George William & Levisa to be paid to them respectively as they become of lawful age if my Executor shall have disposed of my estate agreeable to this my last will and testament if not as soon thereafter as it is disposed of in said manner - In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and this 30th day of October 1820.
