with all and singular the appurtenances thereto be-
longing

I then I will and bequeath unto my son James O'Bell
this here forever all that tract of land the life estate
of which is above bequeathed to him, and then to take effect
after his death all the home he has with my negroes
land the appurtenances one cow and calf and
Hatchers bed and furniture and such other
furniture as I have given my other son at their
commencing housekeeping also my shop tools

I then I give and bequeath to my son Joel O'Bell
and his heirs forever all that tract of land said
to contain one hundred and twenty three acres
beginning on the bank of Manning's creek at and at
Beards and the corner of the land purchased of Ben-
jamin thence S 22. 40 E one hundred and 93 poles to the
middle of the creek corner of land purchased of Doctor Duke
thence S 68. 10 E 112 poles to the corner of the land devised
to Samuel Bell thence S 23 East to Manning's creek thence
up the creek to the beginning being thence with all
the other articles which I have given him towards house
keeping

I then I will and bequeath unto my son William O'Bell
and his heirs forever one hundred and twenty three acres of
land being the same more or less beginning at the north
southeast corner of the land devised to James O'Bell thence
S 22 E crossing the creek and continuing on Marshall's
to line till it strikes Strider's line at a stake thence with

I then I will and bequeath to my son Lewis O'Bell and
my daughter Betty ^{to be equally divided} ~~to be equally divided~~ the land they now live on, as
but their plantations to them and their heirs forever
and forever of such here to return to my heirs forever
with every other thing ^{things} they have had from me in my lifetime
it is my wish if Lewis O'Bell should die before his wife Betty
that she should live on the said land ^{forever} ~~forever~~ her widow
good but is not to destroy the timber unnecessarily &
after the expiration of her term I give and bequeath
it to my son Benjamin O'Bell the said land to
him and his heirs forever with all the appurtenances
therein belonging

I then I give and bequeath to my Grand-Daughter
Sally O'Bell three hundred dollars to be raised out of
my estate to take effect at the decease of my wife
I then I give and bequeath to my daughter Ann O'Bell

 one hundred dollars to be paid out of my estate
 lastly I nominate and appoint my wife and two sons
 John and James B. B. and the executor of this my last
 will and testament receiving all other debts and legacies &
 the proceeds and am paid in that my wife be allowed to

 plantation during her life and such things as it may be necessary
 to be sold and the money to be divided to collect among
 my living children & all two divided the whole to be sold
