do appoint my Friends James Young Esq. and  
George Stewart Esq. of Pittsburgh Alleghany and  
Pennsylvania and William P. Fleming of Fleming  
County Kentucky Executors to see the same  
duly fulfilled & executed - Witness my hand &  
seal this fifth day of April in the year  
of our Lord one thousand eight hundred & twenty  
four.
