Under the last will and testament of the late Francis Kenoy of Fleming County & State of Kentucky being of sound mind, but weak in body and calling to mind the uncertainty of this life, I do hereby declare this to be my last will and testament. After my decease when it may please Almighty God to take me hence my body I commend to its mother Earth till it shall please him that gave it to raise it a gain and my spirit to the same glorious God. With regard to my worldly goods, after all my debts are paid I will and bequeath all my Estate both real and personal to my beloved wife Polly Saunders during her widowhood but in case she may ever hang her inclination by marrying a gain, she shall have only her share as the law directs during her natural life. To my beloved daughter Elizabeth Plummer I will and bequeath to her the land now in possession of my son in law Isaiah Plummer her husband with all the small matters I have done for her is all that I am able to do for her. To my beloved sons James and Lewis Saunders, I will and bequeath to them after their mother's death or change of situation by marrying a gain if such a thing ever should take place one hundred acres of land shall it say fifty acres apiece with its proportionable part of timbered and cleared land out of the tract where I now live. But my beloved wife Polly Saunders in whose discretion I have the utmost confidence as a tender mother may have the same land off and give to them, or either of them as she may think best to do for her and their mutual good. The residue of my land where I now live being one hundred thirty acres more or less, I will and bequeath to my beloved sons, Charles Saunders, Squire Saunders and William Saunders to be equally divided amongst them, after the decease of the mother. To my beloved daughter Polly Saunders I will and bequeath to her one hundred and fifty dollars in specie to be paid at the discretion of my beloved wife Polly Saunders. With regard to my undivided part of my Estate both real and personal, when it may legally please the property of my heirs, my Executors or Executrix or both of the case may be is directed to sell all and do
