Knowing the certainty of death and uncertainty of life I do constitute this my last will my spirit to them that guard it and my body to its mother Sarah believing assuredly it will be raised again. To my Son Nathaniel Kinnaman I confirm to him all the property and money I have given him to the amount of fifteen hundred dollars. To my son Thomas Kinnaman the sum of hundred dollars which has been already given him in land money and slaves. To my son Wm. Kinnaman two hundred acres of land part of the tract where I now live as my land also divided by the top after his mother's death and the second choice to my son Alfred Anderson one hundred and fifty acres of land value a fine hundred dollars there to be charged also with one hundred dollars advanced the balance to be paid
