

## WILL OF GEORGE J. McGUIRE

May 17, 1932.

I, GEORGE J. McGUIRE being of sound mind and desiring to make my last will and Testament do witness of my property as follows, to wit:

First I desire that all my just debts and funeral expenses be paid.

I hereby give to my grand children, Nettie McGuire daughter of W. J. McGuire & Mrs. Spears daughter of Minnie Spears all the farm known as the D. J. Burche farm adjoining Mine & John Wells land.

I feel that my son Frank McGuire has been given some more than the other heirs and I desire that \$50. Five Hundred Dollars be divided equally among the other heirs to help make them equal with the value given by me to Frank McGuire before he shares any.

I feel that I have given Minnie Spears Seven Hundred Dollars more in value than to my other children, & to make that up to them, I desire that \$700. or Seven Hundred Dollars be paid to the other heirs before Minnie Spears begins to share equally with my other ~~other~~ children.

I desire that Corn Crider account for three hundred Dollars to be reserved out of my estate and paid to my other children before she begins to share equally.

I hereby give to my wife Callie McGuire the house hold goods at the home place on Johns Creek, and I give to her for her life my real estate to in Prestonsburg Ky. and one hundred Dollars in money. At the death of my said wife I desire that my children inherit said town real estate equally.

Wherefore I reserved certain timber trees on my lands on Johns Creek, which was that that is 14 inches and up, I desire that my Administrator or at some time using his best judgment to sell said timber trees and divide the money equally among my children.

Other than the requests hereinbefore made, I desire that my Administrator divide all my Bonds, money Bonds, stocks and all other personal property of every kind equally among my children.

Should any one of my heirs bring suit to set this will aside, I hereby give all the art that that one would have received to my other children and direct that that one shall not have any of my estate.

I hereby appoint my son W. J. McGuire Administrator of my estate, and without the requirement of bonds, and direct that he carry out the provisions of this will.

This will is signed by my own hand and I have called at the time George Archer & Jo E. Davidson as witnesses and they do witness same to be my free voluntary act & deed.
