I John Hall being of sound mind and "knowing the uncertainty of life and the certainty of death do hereby make my last will and testament as follows, in regard to my Grand son William Martin and my Great Grand son Edgar Howell and my Great Grand daughter Elizabeth Howell now infant heirs, I want their portion of my money and personal Chattels at my death reduced to Cash and placed with the Bank of Virginia or some other reliable Bank or Trust Company at interest to be delivered to each of said heirs as he or she becomes twenty one years of age.

I Janus Bobb of Prestonsburg, Floyd County Ky, realizing the certainty of death, and the uncertainty of life and being of good mind and memory do make the following my last will and testament

1st I will and bequeath to my dearly beloved wife Elizabeth, all my personal property of every species and kind, debts, accounts, books and every thing I own of a personal character, she to have the complete and absolute title to it and she is authorized to sell and dispose of her any part of it as she may desire.

2nd. I will and devise to my said wife, the lot in Prestonsburg, Ky. I now occupy as a home the lot on which my dwelling house now stands, ~~stands~~ in the place of said town as two lots, the same lot I purchased from R. B. Friend, lying between the lot occupied by Mrs. Martha Hallyfield and Beverly Hallyfield and the cross street just below the lot held by the Common School district of Prestonsburg, Ky.

My said wife is to have, hold, and use the whole of the said lot her life time; but she is hereby empowered and authorized to sell and convey, and pass a perfect title thereby to any part of said lot fronting second street, the portion conveyed not to extend back in said lot further than one hundred feet from the line of said second street. She may divide the portions she is hereby empowered to sell into lots of any size the purchaser may desire.

3rd. I appoint my said wife, Elizabeth, executrix of this my last will and testament and she may qualify and act as such without being required to execute bond as such.

4th. Of the proceeds arising from the sale of my personal or real estate, I desire that my just debts be paid.

In the settlement of my estate, and carrying into effect the various provisions of this will, I request my said executrix to employ John C. Hopkins of Prestonsburg, Kentucky as her adverse and attorney.

I appoint my dearly beloved wife, guardian of my two infant children, George and Elizabeth.

Be it remembered that I, George C. Goble, of the city of Huntington, W. Va., in the State of West Virginia, being of sound mind and memory, do hereby make this my last Will and Testament.

My Executors to be my sons, George C. Goble, Jr., and Thomas E. Dimick, to serve without bonds or security.

I give bequeath and devise my estate as follows:
1st To my son George C. Goble, Jr. one half of my property real personal and mixed, subject to the payment of my just debts and funeral expenses, and other cash, claims named below.

2nd To my son Thomas E. Dimick, the remaining one half of my estate with same qualification named for his brother George C. Goble, Jr. in first paragraph.

3rd I especially give and bequeath my "Six forty six" Hatch to G. H. Dimick, Jr. conditioned that if his son G. H. Dimick, 3rd, attains the age of 21 years and the within term and service, he shall then become the property of said G. H. Dimick, 3rd.

4th I especially give and bequeath to Thomas E. Dimick my above said Farmstead and surrounding instruments.

5th I have made no provisions for my family of my dear and loved wife Mary, Goble, nor my full faith, that George and Thomas will be able to take care of me and my family and I am comforted when needed so far as circumstances permit.

6th I should there be found at the time of my death my personal or household effects and when taken of same, my family can be sent to my brother's home and his family now in Rochester New York. I desire my executors to make such distribution of said tokens as they believe will best conform to the feelings of respect and affection of home always felt for the said brother and his family.

7th I do like my mother as in No. 6 I will ask my executors to remember the sister of my beloved wife Mary (deceased) Mrs. Anna Baker now residing with her family in Buffalo, New York State.

8th I do my funeral to be plain and inexpensive. No funeral service to be preached. My funeral place to be through family of my sister, in town 1915. I do not Baker and her family, but in Forest Grove Cemetery, Buffalo, N. Y. I wish the remains of my late devoted and faithful wife Mary Goble.
