

The last Will & Testament of John Hafferty, Sen of Bull
Creek, Floyd County Kentucky.

Being in sound mind and disposing memory,
and being in full health and desiring to give expression to
the reason for the disposition of that following property owned by
me, I do make and publish this my last Will & Testament, hereby
revoking any other Will I may have made conflicting herewith.

My grandson, Floyd Hafferty is indebted to me in the
sum of Nine Hundred and seventy five dollars (\$975.00)
evidenced by his promissory note for that sum in part con-
sideration for certain lands conveyed by me to him and my
granddaughter, Anna Hafferty, is also indebted to me in the
sum of \$2400.00 evidenced by her
promissory note executed and delivered to me in payment of
part consideration for a certain tract or parcel of land con-
veyed by me to her, both of which tracts of land are situated on
Bull Creek, Floyd County Kentucky.

Whereas, it was the understanding and agreement
that these notes and each of them were to be paid by their
taking care of me and my wife, Elizabeth Hafferty, and provid-
ing for and maintaining, and to attend upon us during the remain-
der of our natural lives,

Or where, each of said grand children have made
their home with us since their early childhood, and it is
my desire to provide for them by giving and bequeathing
to each of them the amount of said notes respectively
or any part thereof that may remain unpaid at my
decease, and I hereby give and deliver unto the possession
of Floyd Hafferty the said note, executed by him for the sum
of \$975.00, and unto Anna Hafferty the note, executed by her
for the sum of \$2400.00, and it is my desire, and I wish that
no part of said notes be collected by my administrators
or Executor from either of them.

Whereas Harry Hafferty, Jerry Hafferty and Walter Haf-
ferty, my grand children, are indebted to me in the
sum of Nine Hundred (\$900.00) Dollars evidenced by
note as part consideration for a certain tract or parcel
of land situated on Bull Creek, Floyd County Kentucky,
conveyed by mine to them.

Now it is my desire that at my death that no part
of said notes remaining unpaid shall be paid by them
but same is hereby given to the said Harry Hafferty,
Jerry Hafferty and Walter Hafferty and they are released from
the payment of said notes, and it is my desire and I wish
that no part of said notes be collected from them at my

decease, provided however, that the amount of said notes,
and all of them are charged entirely with the duty of taking care
of me and my wife, Elizabeth Hafferty, so long as we shall
live, and to provide the necessary food clothing and attention in
our comfort, during all of our natural life, and it is my desire
and I wish to give to them whatever amount of said notes
remaining unpaid, and the said so conveyed to them, and to this
end I have this day released said notes, and delivered to the
possession of said Harry Hafferty, Jerry Hafferty and Walter
Hafferty.
