2^d - I will to my son Stephen Stone one dollar & being his whole interest in my real estate & personal property.

3^d - I will to my daughter Rebecca Holbrook a piece of land at the upper end of my farm on the left hand side of the Creek beginning as follows beginning on a rock in the field near the mouth of a stream at the foot of the hill, thence with the main straight line to the top of the hill thence with my back line down the point to the Creek thence with the Creek to a opposite of the beginning thence a straight line to the beginning.

4th - I will to my daughter Sarah Boston a piece of land on the same side of the Creek at the lower end beginning as follows, beginning at the Creek on George Stone's line thence with Stone's line to the water's line thence with the said water's line to Anthony Hackworth's line thence with the said Hackworth line to the Creek thence with the Creek to be beginning.

5th - I will to my son and daughter the balance of my estate my son George Stone is to make the division line between him and his sister and Sarah Grace is to have Charles of the devise. In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal this the 28th day of July 1874.

I will and bequeath to my wife Susan Clark all my real estate which I now own in said County and State on the waters of Johnson Creek and bounded as follows: beginning on a line on near a lake corner between T. H. Hatfield and myself thence a straight line to the top of the hill thence around the top of the hill to E. B. Harris line thence down the hill with E. B. Harris line to the top corner thence with the meanders of said creek to Johnson Creek thence up the Creek to the beginning to have and to hold the same with all the appurtenances thereto to be having or in anywise obtaining so long as she lives and at her death the same to go to my son William D. Clark provided he shall pay Margaret Stone, Susan Clark, Susan Hatfield, Thomas Clark and Martha E. I Henry C. Fitzpatrick being of sound mind and disposing
memory do make and publish this as my last will and Testament
I do and bequeath to my son Stephen Fitzpatrick and the heirs of
his body free from any debt or liability which my said son shall
owe or may hereafter owe the farm where he now lives & known
as the old Stephen Hamilton farm or so much of it as is embraced
in the following boundary: Beginning at a spring on the right hand
fork of Middle Creek in Floyd County at the upper end of the bush
field where the grave yard is thence running down with the Creek
to the lower head end of the Howard field thence running with the
cross fence to the top of the hill on the North side of the Creek thence
with the top of the ridge between the Barn Branch and the Branch
where he lives to the top of the ridge between Abbott & Middle Creek;
thence around the head of the Branch to the center of the ridge which
divides the center of where Boya Holbrook's line from the branch
where my said son lives; thence running down said ridge to the
road near said son's barn; thence running across the barn field
a straight line from the point to the Creek, thence running down
with the Creek to the opposite the house where Wiley Hale now lives
thence straight down through the field so as to include the house
to the bank above the point thence fifty yards around with
the bank to a stake thence to the foot of the hill and up same
to the top of the point thence with the point to the top of the divi-
ding ridge between the two forks of Middle Creek thence running
down said dividing ridge to the head of a small stream above
the barn field thence down said stream to the beginning
Second. - I will and bequeath to my daughter Cynthia Holbrook
(wife of Boya Holbrook) and the heirs of his body all of the upper
end of the said old Stephen Hamilton farm which is not
embraced in the above boundary bequeathed to my son
Stephen Fitzpatrick and this is to carry with it all of the roads
and rights of way over the land given my son Stephen which
are necessary to the use and enjoyment of the land hereby given
to my said daughter which right and privilege is to pass
with said land. Thirdly. I will and bequeath to my son Joseph
& Fitzpatrick and the heirs of his body free from any debt which
my said son now owes or may hereafter owe the land where
he now lives on the right hand fork of Middle Creek bounded
as follows: Beginning at the spring on the dividing line between
said land and the land bequeathed to my son Stephen
thence running with said line to the top of the ridge between
the two forks of Middle Creek the right and left hand forks
thence running down said ridge to the head of the stream or
spring to flow on the opposite side of the Creek from my son
thence running across said hollow to the bottom thence
running across with the foot of the bank at the back
little bottom to the mouth of the stream and
