1. I do as my will that my funeral expenses and all my just debts be paid.

2. I give, devise and bequeath to my beloved son Albert Love in lieu of his dower, one mule named John mares color, about eleven years old, one mare saddle and one rifle gun, one farm wagon and one mowing machine, one dinner bell and two hogs, one feather bed and one bedstead and four pillows and feather bolsters and eighteen bed quilts and one bottom turning plow and his grand father Love's enlarged picture and one stand table and his father's large zinc trunk and one long wash kettle.

3. I give and bequeath to my beloved daughter Ella Love in lieu of her dower one red cow named Cherry 3 yrs old and three hogs also black white spotted

(A sow and two sheats) one organ, Cornell brand which is now at Mary Bottom and one Singer sewing machine and her mother's side saddle and one dressed white marble top and her mother's big trunk and one dining room table 2 ft long and one red cherry stand table, and one set of chairs and one 4 day clock and one red water set a pitcher and 6 glasses and one large bible cost \$9.50 and one bedstead (yellow) two featherbeds and two feather bolsters and four pillows and twenty bed covers, first choice and all my enlarged pictures and all my notes and money which is deposited in the First National Bank, Fossburg, Ky. and one big wash kettle and one big red flowered meat dish.

4. I give and bequeath to my beloved husband Buck Hatfield in lieu of his dower two shares, cotton black and white spotted and to have the use of the mule and saw till the 1st day of September 1913 and one stove and stove wood.

(5) I give and bequeath to my beloved daughter Gay Hatfield one feather bed and two pillows and enough covers to supply same and one red heifer about 1 yr old.

(6) I give and bequeath to my beloved daughter Ella Boyd one dollar in lieu of her dower.

7. I give and bequeath to my beloved daughter Lillie Smith in lieu of her dower one dollar and one cover lid (bed cover).
