In the name of God Amen I John Brown
of Franklin County and State of Kentucky being
weakly in body but sound in mind and memory
making that it is appointed for all men to die
Do hereby make and Ordain this my last will and

Testament in manner and form following this Twentieth day
of September One thousand Eight hundred and five.

Item I give and bequeath unto my wife Nancy Brown one
Negro Woman of the name of Hannah and the use of a Negro
man of or called Jagg Jim and at his death to my son Wil-
liam Brown and in case William never returns from the
Army the said Jagg Jim to go to my daughter Obedience likewise
to my wife Two feather beds and furniture likewise my big black
mare and Gray horse and all my Saring Cows to dispose of
at his pleasure Only the above Jam, likewise my toome Ho
gears and Six Cows and Two Spanning Huals likewise I
give her one third part of my Cattle, Hogs, and Sheep
One half of my potato, One half of my Barthen ware like
the Corn Cupboard and a large Walnut Chest shamp
two plates and two Belling Hoes likewise a Half dozen
and forks - I lend the plantation I now live upon to my
wife during her natural life or all down here likewise a
large Iron Kettle, pot and dutch oven, and my Sugar
and Sugar Desk.

Item, I give and bequeath unto my son

all the land I now own in South Season not divided away likewise a bay
horse with a small steer in the forehead of the name of Warwick likewise
a horse coat of the name of Lucy likewise one feather bed and furniture
to him and his heirs forever.

Item, I give and bequeath unto my Daughter Polly Brown what
she has had in possession already received. Also my Riding
mare and no more. She a love to her and her heirs forever.

Item, I give and bequeath unto my son (Dermot Brown the land
and plantation I now live upon his mother not to be interrupted
her natural life likewise a negro man of the name of Little Jim
likewise a negro man Two feather beds and furniture, likewise
a large brown horse by the name of Jack, likewise my dog
and Book case and Six Walnut Chairs likewise the balance
of my Hogs not given away likewise half the balance of my
sheep, likewise two Belling Hoes to him and his heirs forever.

Item, I give and bequeath unto my Daughter Abundance Brown
One negro woman of the name of Bell likewise a bay mare
came out of my Riding mare of the name of Gerney, likewise
One bar and side board likewise two Matha Beds and fur-
-ture likewise One Sitts rug &c. likewise that part of
the Sheep not given away to her likewise one small Trunk
likewise the Balance of pewter and Barthen ware to her and
her heirs forever. My Will is that Six months after my
decease that all of my property that is not given away shall
be sold at Public Sale and equally divided between my wife
and William & Daniel & Obedience. - My Will and
desire is that my Bro. Jesse Brown and Daniel Brown
and William Montgomery do act as the Administrators
of my Will and Testament. I do hereby disannul all other
Wills by me and this to stand firm.

Item, I give and bequeath unto my Son (Daniel) Brown the land and plantation I now live upon his mother not to be interrupted her natural life likewise a negro man of the name of Little Jim likewise a negro man two feather beds and furniture, likewise a large brown horse by the name of Jack, likewise my dog and Book Case and six or about (I have likewise the balance of my hog not given away likewise half the berries of my sheep, likewise two bullock hoes to him and his heirs forever.

Item, I give and bequeath unto my (Daughter) Abundance Brown one negro woman of the name of Bill likewise a bay mare came out of my riding mare of the name of Gummy, likewise one bar and side board likewise two feather beds and furniture, likewise one kiln my self likewise that part of the sheep not given away to her likewise one small trunk likewise the balance of pewter and Earthen ware to her and her heirs forever. My Will is that six months after my decease that all of my property, that is not given away shall be sold at Public Sale, and equally divided between my wife and William & Daniel & Abundance. My Will and desire is that my Bro. Nijse Brown and Daniel Brown and William Montgomery do act, as the Administrators of my Will and Testament. I do hereby disannul all other Wills by me and this to stand firm.
