 to two twenty dollar bank notes making sixty dollars.
 I sent Daniel when the said Daniel lived at H. Portsmouth 40
 To one bed without furniture or shade 12
 To about eight weeks of sundry at H. Portsmouth 11
 Credits for moneys I have received of son Daniel One hundred dollars for commending a flat boat of peaches I got of Col. James Johnson at the crossing 100
 A ten dollar bill I received of Daniel the winter he got the old gray horse 10
 James months received one negro girl Sugee 300
 received plain & decenting to back abagging factory in South Frankfort 100
 One bed & furniture & other articles to begin with and one cow I suppose to be worth 60

The above debts & debts made out this year on the day of September 1829 were paid twenty nine 1829 the day after my son John's funeral was preached at New Light of the methodist order.

 On the first day of January 1833 I my son William settled here charged negroes the above Boy Charles is my property. Flemonson m.m. I ~~was~~ father have paid him in the trade all the money I borrowed of him or other wise my son William has received in the slave Flemonson \$300 and Flemonson is Wm's entire & William has not received but three hundred dollars of my estate in any way.

Elisha Hawkins, Jr. of the County of Franklin, State of Kentucky being at this of perfect mind & will in every but calling to mind the mortality of all things do hereby ordain & establish this instrument of writing as my last will & testament. In the first place I commend my soul into the hands of almighty God my body to be decently buried by my executors to be hereinafter named. It is my will that the plantation of land on which I now live as well as all or any other of my real estate as well as all my slaves & their increase shall all my personal estate of every kind including money & the one I shall belong to William Hawkins (black) who I raised & his heirs forever, & all the property I received by my second wife at the time I married her shall remain to her again. I hereby appoint the said William Hawkins the executor of this my last will & testament & do hereby name as witnesses my hand & seal this 2nd day of January 1824.

death of my wife the land and stock that she may have to get
her with the house hold and kitchen furniture farming
utensils I wish to be equally divided between my four sons
namely Thomas C. Pulliam Zachariah C. Pulliam George
W. Pulliam Edward C. Pulliam Item I wish to be equally divided
between my sons Thomas C. Pulliam George and Edward C. Pulliam
by my first wife namely Elizabeth Pulliam & Hamis the
Pulliam and Nelson Pulliam and my daughter
Catherine Pulliam and my grand son Joseph Richard
Pulliam son of my daughter Mary Pulliam to be equally
divided between them thirty two acres of land being part
of the tract on which I now live and bounded by
