his room on Saturday Evening the 4th inst. and he stated to me that he had

and the family. But said last night he had been quite unwell and  
he knew he was nearly at his last hour, he knew he could not live much longer  
and that it was his wish that the property he had, should remain in the hands  
of the family for the support of his mother and family or in words to that effect, and that  
he died on the next Sunday after this conversation.

made. I do hereby give all of my estate both real personal and mixed when ever  
the same may be such Philip Sargent my executor, intendant for the following purposes  
Ist That all my real estate and heretofore and after they are all chosen to be

by him in trust for my family, my wife and children to be divided to the best advantage  
I can, proportion that they should have enjoyed it had I died intestate and any other person  
I have an ample and sufficient support, and do hereby authorize and empower my  
said executor and trustee from time to time to sell and convey any of my said estate and mixed  
and on such terms as he may deem most to the advantage of my wife, and also to confer such any other  
that may seem necessary or claims that may be applied against my estate and with the proceeds  
of my estate, I authorize said trustee and executor to purchase for the same person any stock and  
from time to time to buy and to invest the same and also to make such other things as he may think proper  
the residue of my estate after the payment of my debts and charges to be paid to my wife and children to be  
held in trust for the benefit of my family in such manner as they shall hold the same had I died  
intestate, provided in default in any event my wife to have an ample and sufficient support -  
I hereby make Philip Sargent my sole trustee and executor of this my will and hereby full confidence  
in his integrity request that he may qualify without giving bond for such
