Had a conversation with the late William H. Warren who died for me to go to
his room on Saturday Evening the 4th inst. and he stated to me that he had
wrote him to make something to live on and for the support of his father, mother
and the family. But said last night he had been quite unwell and
he knew he was nearly at his last hour, he knew he could not live much longer
and that it was his wish that the property he had, should remain with him, or
of the family for the support of his mother and family, or in words to that effect, and that
he died on the next Sunday after this conversation.
