Jane Agnes

In the Name of God Amen, I Jane Agnes of the County of Franklin and State of Kentucky, knowing the substance of life and the certainty of death, do declare this instrument to be my last will and testament that

First It is my will and desire, that after my decease that my body shall be decently buried, and that all of my just debts and funeral expenses shall be paid out of the proceeds of my disposable estate.

Secondly I will and bequeath the farm I now reside on, situated in Frankfort County containing seventy four acres by survey adjoining William Snodgrass and the widow Jane Snodgrass farm, to my daughter Eliza Allen wife of Stephen Allen during his natural life time, then the same farm shall be the property of the heirs of Eliza Allen's body forever, but if the said Eliza Allen should die without any surviving heirs, then it is my will that the above named farm shall be the property of my own brother and sister.

Thirdly It is my will that my servant, John Penn shall be hired out until he is twenty five years of age, and it is my will that the said John Penn shall receive the amount of his last years hire for his own special benefit.

Fourthly I will & bequeath to my daughter Eliza Allen the sum of her body for to be paid in one hundred and seventy five dollars for the use & benefit of the said Eliza Allen her heirs forever.

Fifthly - I will all of my house furniture, belonging to my daughter Eliza Allen, and her heirs forever.

Sixth It is my will that the proceeds of the hire of my boy John, and also the rent of a house and lot in the village of Harrodsdale in Shelby County my daughter, and other debts due my son, my husband's estate, both John Agnes deceased some three hundred dollars now in the hands of Thomas Peeler of Shelby County my counsellor and attorney at law for collector shall be collected and transferred to the order of this my last will and testament, and it is further my will that my executor shall loan out said money for the benefit of Eliza Allen and her heirs. - But should Eliza Allen die leaving no surviving heir, it is my will that the above named money shall be equally divided between my own brother and sister.

Seventh I appoint William Mc Neal of Harrison County Ky and Edmund Bailey Esqr of Franklin County Ky, the executors of this my last will and testament given from under my hand and seal this 21st day of October in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and fifty five

Highways of Spring Oct 20 1855  
Witness my hand and seal this my last will and testament

First I give my wife, Susan Mc Whittington seventy six acres of land lying on the north end of my farm, the line to be drawn due East and West across a

second Beginning at the corner of W. H. Whittington and W. H. Wilson thence due East to a grain line thence due West the piece is twenty acres at being the South end of the land I bought of Mr. George, my wife has the power to sell the above said piece of land the proceeds of which are to pay my debts or to educate my daughter Mary Mc Whittington either as my wife may choose

Third I leave the remainder of my farm to the management of my wife for the mutual benefit of herself and children

Fourth If my wife is now in the pregnant state, my will is that the property be given when she has a child - But in case the child dies before its mother dies, she has the power to do as she pleases with the land

Fifth My wife has the power to sell any or all of my personal estate as she may see fit to go to the payment of my debts or the education of my daughter Mary Mc Whittington

Sixth The ballance of my farm as herebefore mentioned I give to my daughter Mary Mc Whittington to be managed by my wife for the mutual benefit of both herself and my daughter Mary Mc Whittington until she (the daughter) marries - after her marriage it is my will that the husband shall manage the farm for the benefit of himself and the whole family, but that my wife retains the power to manage so much of the house as she may see fit for her own use

Seventh - I give my house, doors the Whittington who is now living with me
