I appoint my son John Whitehead my executor and desire that the County Court shall not be responsible of the performance of the trust & herein contained in here. Be it remembered that I Samuel B. Scofield now being of sound mind & disposing memory and knowing the certainty of death and the uncertainty of life do make this my last will to wit 1<sup>st</sup> after my death it is my will that my executor herein after named will sell so much of my property as will pay all of my just debts & funeral expenses and the remainder of my property I leave to my beloved wife Nancy Scofield during her life that is all of my property and land in Franklin County & after the death of my wife the property is to be divided so follow beginning about six teen feet north of the grave yard, thence running a due west course to the North & South line which runs between my old tract & Wright tract of land thence passing the old line twelve feet, thence north to the Scamdale & Bridgeport turnpike road, thence a few yards west to a line betwixt myself & James B. Roberts thence with that line north to the Scamlean tract of land, thence with another of my lines East to the Kenny road thence with the road South to the Scamdale & Bridgeport turnpike road, thence with the pike a westerly course to the junction of the pike leading to my dwelling house, thence with that pike a southerly course passing the pond far enough so that a due west course will strike the beginning the above boundary of land I give to my daughter Rosamul Jenkins and her children & in the event that my daughter should die first and leave no children it is my will that J. W. Jenkins shall hold the property during his life and at his death to return to my blood relations the balance of my land I give to my son William Scofield and all that is on it of every description household & kitchen furniture farming utensils and books & papers after making the reserves as follows I give to my son S. Scofield seven hundred dollars I give to my daughter Rosamul Jenkins one bed and bedding I give to my grand son S. Scofield one bed and bedding and give to

Samuel O. Roberts one bed & bedding & one hundred and  
 dollars, I give to my daughter Lucy A. Roberts all of her  
 Roberts notes and accounts. I give to my daughter Susan  
 Jenkins my bank stock in the Farmers Bank, in no case shall  
 son William be bound to pay the above gifts if the property  
 be destroyed by fire or otherwise. I give to my son William  
 in trust for my daughter Lucy Ann Roberts all of my property  
 in realty &c. by both real & personal to have and to hold for the  
 benefit of her and such family as she may have the trustee is au-  
 thorized to sell and convey any part or all of said property for the  
 use & benefit of her & her family. If I should sell the property  
 during my life, at my death my trustee that I have appointed  
 shall take charge of the remainder of the proceeds and use  
 it for her benefit. I reserve one half acre of land around the  
 grave yard for a family burying ground. I give to my son  
 William Scofield my mill Lot and all the stock and property  
 of every description to pay the several gifts above specified.  
 Lastly I constitute and appoint my son William Scofield  
 as my executor to carry out my will and that without seal  
 with under my hand this 17<sup>th</sup> day of June 1873.

Codicil

I Samuel B. Scofield since writing the above that I have  
 not made any arrangement to fence the grave yard in now  
 I direct my executor to retain sixty dollars from each one  
 of my children for that purpose to wit John Scofield, Lucy  
 Ann Roberts, Hossanah Jenkins. The size to be enclosed is eight  
 five feet square to be made of good rock, the north wall is to  
 run on the division line, which is sixteen feet from the North  
 pine tree which stands in the grave yard, the above sum is to  
 fence and to put a plain head and foot stones to my grave and  
 Scofield my wife. My daughter Rosannah is to have a silver ladder  
 my wife brought given under my hand this 30<sup>th</sup> day of Sept 1875
