dollars, I give to my daughter Lucy A. Roberts all of
Roberts notes and accounts. I give to my daughter Susan
Jenkins my bank stock in the Farmers Bank, in no case shall
son William be bound to pay the above gifts if the property
be destroyed by fire or otherwise. I give to my son William
in trust for my daughter Lucy Ann Roberts all of my property
in Shelby Co. Ky. both real & personal to have and to hold for
benefit of her and such family as she may have the trustee is au-
thorized to sell and convey any part or all of said property for
use & benefit of her & her family. If I should sell the property
during my life, at my death my trustee that I have appointed
shall take charge of the remainder of the proceeds and use
it for her benefit. I reserve one half acre of land around the
grave yard for a family burying ground. I give to my son
William Scofield my mill Lot and all the stock and property
of every description to pay the several gifts above specified.
Lastly I constitute and appoint my son William Scofield
as my executor to carry out my will and that without seal
with under my hand this 17th day of June 1873.

Codicil

I Samuel B. Scofield since writing the above that I have
not made any arrangement to fence the grave yard in now
I direct my executor to retain sixty dollars from each one
of my children for that purpose to wit John Scofield, Lucy
Ann Roberts, Rosannah Jenkins. The size to be enclosed is eight
five feet square to be made of good rock, the north wall is to
run on the division line, which is sixteen feet from the North
pine tree which stands in the grave yard, the above sum is to
fence and to put a plain head and foot stones to my grave and
Scofield my wife. My daughter Rosannah is to have a silver ladder
my wife brought given under my hand this 30th day of Sept 1875

to be held by her for and during her life time and not to subject
to the debts of her husband and not to be controlled by him after her
death the lot is to go to the children of her body and after her
youngest child becomes of age the property is to be sold by
them and the proceeds to be divided between them. 3^d I give
and devise to my wife Mrs Sarah H. Ayres the house & lot
in South Frankfort on which lot I now reside fronting

furniture thereon and Twenty one shares of Stock Town in the
Farmers Bank of Kentucky to be held by her during her life

Frankfort & twenty shares of Bank Stock and all the rest

at 21 years of age, and I hereby nominate and appoint said
Church as guardian of both of said boys, and he shall have
the same control over both of them as if he was their natural
father, and the Court is requested to allow him to qualify as such
guardian without giving any bond. 2nd I have about \$5000
of notes against W. H. McMillan and my executor is directed
not to sue on said notes, but will use his best efforts to collect
whatsoever he can without suit if possible, but with suit if he think
best to do so, but my executor will not be required to list these notes
as I suppose them of but little value, and he will only account
for whatever he may happen to collect on them. 3rd I hereby
appoint said Robert Church executor of this will, and direct
the Court to allow him to qualify without giving bond, and if
I shall die before I make a deed to Webster for land I sold
him, my said executor is hereby authorized and directed to
make the deed as soon as all the purchased money shall be paid
given under my hand and seal this 21st day of March A. D. 1879.
