declare this my last will and testament, hereby revoking all former wills hereunto made in
Test. Subscribed my wife, Lucretia Graham and Thomas C. Pugh, executors present of this my
last will, with full power and authority to sell all my estate by advertisement or otherwise
to sell and convey any real estate of which I may die seized, and to receive the proceeds
and that I have sold upon the receipt of the purchase money

2^d I wish my executor and executor ad litem as Comendants taking off all my just debts
of every description, and after the payment of my debts, the my wife and all my money shall
be put out into stocks of otherwise for the support of my wife and our children, and she
is to support them out of my estate and not be chargeable with the money to be used in their
education, clothing, &c. I desire that the money to be taken from the estate for the support of
my wife and family, and if she shall think fit to sell any of them, that she would be bound to do so
as she thinks proper to sell to the best advantage, their own interest, and to convey the same
by deed or otherwise at any time they shall think it adviseable to sell any Real
Estate or other stock which I may hold and to invest the same if they shall think it
more advantageous for my family, or real estate, I give my son William my good and
undivided share of my mother and she shall be able to take one of it. I do not want any
share or inventory of my personal estate made out by my executor or executor

declare this my last will and testament, hereby revoking all former wills hereunto made in
Test. Subscribed my wife, Lucretia Walker and Thomas C. Pugh, executors present of this my
last will, with full power and authority to sell all my estate by advertisement or otherwise
to sell and convey any real estate of which I may die seized, and to receive the proceeds
and that I have sold upon the receipt of the purchase money

wife Cadie during the term of her natural life all my real and personal estate, and at the
decease of said Cadie the real estate to be devised as follows: viz. the real estate of

of the death of my son Robert, I will and bequeath to said son John one half and that the estate
of the said half of my real estate - Now in the event of my son Robert's son John arriving at the
age of majority and have a child born in wedlock said Robert's son John shall inherit the
portion of said real estate forever. Now in the event of the death of my grandson Robert
child born in wedlock, that part of said real estate which would devolve upon said
grandson shall be partitioned as follows: unto my son John Walker and my daughter
Elizabeth Davis. Also my daughter Catharine Davis forever. Now that part of said
shall devolve upon said Catharine at her decease shall be inherited by her children
forever. Now at the decease of my wife Cadie, my negro woman Belle shall be free
and my other colored woman Sabe shall and devise be sold at the death of my wife
Cadie. Now in the event of my colored woman Sabe being sold, I will and bequeath unto my
son John, fifty dollars out of said sale I will give and bequeath unto my daughter Mary,
Anna and Leare and Catharine one feather bed and bedding each - Also the sum of
Twenty dollars. Now if any thing shall be remaining I will it be divided amongst
all my daughters equal share. I do appoint Thomas Jones an d John C. Patterson to be
my executor and declare this my last will and testament this 12th day of January 1835
