I give and bequeath to my son Robert Comderson the residue of my whole Estate wheresoever I may die possessed of, to him and his heirs forever.

It is my will and desire that my son Robert Comderson, have sufficient schooling at about the age of fourteen years old, and after my son Robert shall have received his say schooling, for my son Robert to be bound to learn the mystery of working Gold, & Silver.

I leave Captain Robert Cole, and William Martin, my whole and sole Executors of this my last will and Testament, and I do further hereby acknowledge this to be my last will, and Testament, Revoking, and disannulling

all other former wills, or Testaments made by me in anywise whosoever, for this, and every thing to be, my last will and Testament. Whence I acknowledge, I have Interchangeably, Set and Offixed by hand and Seal this twenty fourth day of February, one thousand eight hundred and five.

J. Justice of the Court of Gallatin County now
sitting in Court, in the just and full sum of one
thousand dollars, to the payment of which bond
and truly to be made to the said Justice or
their successors, we bind ourselves, our, and each
of our heirs Executors & administrators jointly &
severally firmly by these presents, Sealed with
our seals and dated this 22nd day of June 1805

The condition of the above obligation is
such, that if the above bound Robert Sale, Ex-
ecutor of the last will and testament of Philip
Comstock deceased, do make a true and perfect
Inventory of all and singular the goods chattels
and credits of the said deceased, which have or shall
come to the hands possession or knowledge of
the said Robert Sale, or into the hands or posses-
sion of any other person, or persons, for him, and
the same so made do exhibit into the Court
of Gallatin County, at such time as he shall be
there required by the said Court, and the same
goods chattels, and credits do well and truly

administer according to law, and make a just
and true account of all his doings and dealings
therein, when thereunto required by the said Court.
And further do well and truly pay and deliver
all the legacies contained in the said will as
far as the said goods chattels & credits will
extend, according to the value thereof, and as
the law shall charge him. Then the above
obligation to be void, or else in full force.
