 Do make and ordain this to be my last will and
 Testament that is to say principally and first of all
 I give and recommend my soul into the hands of
 almighty God who gave it, and my body to the
 earth to be buried in a decent like, Christian
 manner at the discretion of my Executors. Nothing
 doubting but at the General Resurrection I shall
 receive the same again by the mighty power of
 God and touching such worldly estate where with I
 hath pleased God to Bless me with; in this life I give
 demise and dispose of in the following manner & form
 first I give and bequeath to my dearly beloved
 wife Anne Hutcherson the plantation that I now live
 on with all my stock of every description and

all my household and kitchen furniture and all farming
 tools to be for — own proper use and benefit for
 ever and also my negroe girl named Lucy except the
 one half of her increase if any there should be, and that
 she is to pay my funeral expences and all my Just
 Debts and to clothe and school my daughter Elizabeth
 decently and well, and that she is to give my daughter
 at the age of fourteen years old one feather bed &
 furniture to be worth thirty five Dollars, in the
 next place I give and bequeath unto my dearly
 beloved daughter Elizabeth Hutcherson my lands lying
 on pitmans creek on the opoist side of the creek from
 Wm. Rheas Land and the half of the increase of my negroe
 if any she should have. And in the last place I
 constitute make and ordain my wife to be my Executor
 and my brother Hatty B Hutcherson my Executor, and
 I do hereby utterly disallow revoke and disannul all
 and every other former wills Testament, Legacies
 or bequeaths and Executors by me in any will before
 named willed and bequeathed, Ratifying & confirming
 this and no other to be my last will and Testament.

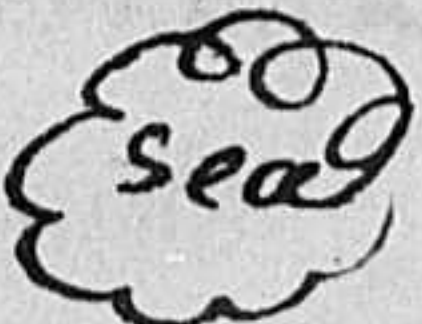

for all men once to die to make and ordain this my last
will and testament; that is to say principally and
first of all I give and recommend my soul into
the hands of almighty God who gave it and a my
recommence to the earth to be buried in a de-
cent christian burial, and as touching such wo-
rldly estate where with it hath pleased God to
bless me in this life I give devise and dispose of
the same in the following manner and form
(viz) First give to my son Jeremiah Black the
whole of my lands and tenements and house
and all my household furniture of every descrip-
tion; by him to be fully possessed and enjoyed

Except one bed and furniture and three cows I give to my
daughter Sarah Bina and I do hereby utterly disallow
revoke and disannul all and every former will ratifying this
and no other to be my last will and testament in witness
whereof I have set my hand and seal this twenty ninth
day of February in the year of our Lord Christ Eighteen
hundred and eight signed sealed and acknowledged
in the presence of, Intended a signet.

Imprimis, It is my desire that my Brother William
Buckner have one hundred pounds out of the lands which
I received from my Father's estate lying in Kentucky, or
out of my Brother Thomas Buckners part of Land that
I purchased of him, being one third of the same.
