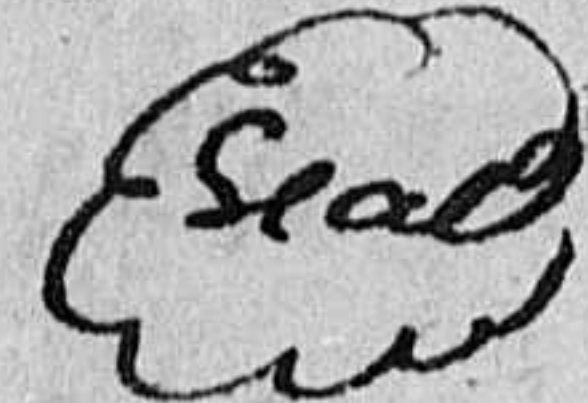

third of my estate which I have left to my wife in
care that she should be the longest liver I have at
her own disposal to be given by her to whomsoever
she may please, made and concluded this 11th
of February in the year of our Lord 1811 Signed

In the Name of our ~~mighty~~ God Amen
I James Smith of the County of Guilf &
State of Kentucky, Engineer — being very Sick & weak
in Boddy but of perfect sound mind & memory, thanks be given unto God:
calling unto mind the mortality of my Boddy and knowing that it is appoin-
ted for all men ^{one} to dye, do make and ordain this my last Will and Testam-
ent; that is to say principally and first of all, I give and recommend
my soul into the hands of all mighty God that gave it, and my
Boddy I recommend to the Earth, to be buried in a decent Chris-
tian burial at the discretion of my Executors, nothing doubting, but at
the General Resurrection I shall receive the same again, by the
mighty Power of God, and as touching ~~the~~ ^{my} ~~Body~~ such worldly
Estate where with it has pleased God to bless me in this life, I give
devise and dispose of the same in the following manner and form Viz.

Item 1st. I give and bequeath to Elizeth Smith my dearly beloved wife the plantation to gather with 500 acres of land whereon I now live, together with all my house hold furniture farming utensils Black Smith tools and Joiners tools, and also my five Negroes together with my ^{usual} mathematical surveying instruments and Books and such portable property as my wife, ^{Elizeth} may think proper to dispose of it is my request that she do so, and the family that is now single to live together until they may think proper to separate, and at the death of my wife my request is that the 500 ^{above} acres mentioned belong to my son George Smith Negro Jack also to George Smith, Negro Bill to my son John Smith Negro Nell to my Daughter Betsey Smith & Negro Rachel to my daughter Susannah Smith

Item 2nd. I will and bequeath unto my son John Smith the 500 acres of land he now lives on

Item 3rd. I will and bequeath two thousand acres of land which lies on the Ohio River to be equally divided amongst my four daughters

Item 4 I will and bequeath my silver watch to George Smith

I like wise constitute and appoint, Elizeth Smith John Smith and George Smith, my sole Exors to make this my last will, hereby revoking disannulling all other Wills and testaments. In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and affixed my seal this 22nd day of April in the year of our Lord 1810.
