I Micajah Cary Geoman of Green County and Commonwealth of Kentucky being weak and low in body, tho' of a sound mind and memory being well apprized of the certainty of death by experiencing the decays of weak human nature; do make constitute and publish this to be my last will and testament and by the same do revoke and destroy all others whatever: first I recommend my soul to almighty God who gave it and my body to the dust from whence it came; As to my worldly effects which God has blessed me with, I will and bequeath in the following manner (to wit) Item 1st That all my last debts and funeral charges be justly paid.

Item 2^d I will and bequeath to my well beloved wife Nancy Cary the tract of land and Plantations whereon I now live containing by estimation one hundred acres together with all my household goods & stock of every kind and also all debts which is due me, and all my Plantation tools together with the following Slaves (Viz) Daniel, Lucy, Little, Lucy, Vina, Abner and Molly to her the said Nancy and her heirs forever.

Item 3^d I will and bequeath to my brother James Cary the

following Slaves, Lynus and Leety, to him and his heirs forever; and do ordain and appoint my trusty friends Saml. Durham and John Chandler Executors to this my last will and testament; In testimony thereof I do hereunto set my hand and seal this 9th day of November in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and six.

Note the words, "I am, Executors," and "thereof," interlined before signed.
