I give and bequeath to my son Jeremiah Walker my Negro (or Mulatto) boy Bob to be delivered to him at the end of seven years from the date hereof, provided my decease is before the expiration of the said seven years and in case I live longer than seven years from this day, then the said Boy, Bob, to be delivered to him as soon as my Executors can be qualified and other necessary steps taken.

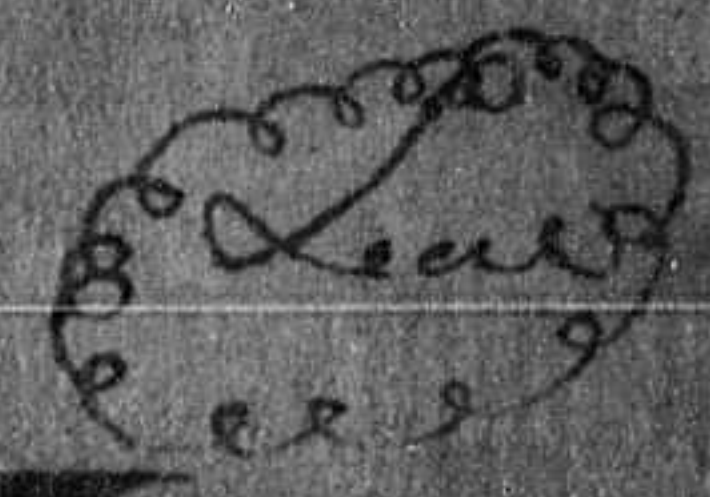
Item I give and bequeath to my son Thomas Walker after his mother's death, my land and plantation with the appurtenances I also give and bequeath him my Negro Boy Billy.

Item I give and bequeath to my daughter Nancy Walker my Negro (or Mulatto) Girl Sarah. It is my will and desire that after the death of my wife all the personal estate I have lent her with the increase thereof be equally divided between my son Thomas Walker and my daughter Nancy Walker and that if either the said Thomas or Nancy Walker die before they arrive at lawfull age or without heir lawfully begotten of their body that the surviving one have that part of my estate bequeathed to the deceased one. As my sons John Jones Walker and Pa^r Walker and Martha Albert Bond has already been provided for in some part, I give to each of them twenty five cents. I appoint my wife Elizabeth Walker, and Luke Ford as Executors and Executrix of this my last will and testament under my hand and Seal this thirtieth

of November in the year of our Lord eight hundred and one

In the name of God Amen I Thomas Charlton of Green County and State of Kentucky being weak in body but perfect of mind and memory, calling to mind the uncertainty of life and the certainty of death, but the great uncertainty of the time thereof do hereby make and appoint this my last will and testament. i.e. I render unto Almighty God my soul (who gives it first) desiring that my body be decently buried and do hereby appoint Roger Mournings of Green County and State of Kentucky and also John Mournings of Adams County and State aforesaid to execute this my last will and testament. In the first place I desire that all my just debts be paid out of my estate, after which I will and bequeath unto Peggy, Polly and Jincy Mournings three several moieties to be equally and proportionably divided amongst them, I also give unto John Mournings a Parshaw plow with all tacklings belonging thereto; also I will and bequeath unto Sally Driffly a large salt bottle all the remainder of my property consisting of two horse breaches, the plantation I purchased of John my crop of corn, and whatever else there may be

herein specified, I desire to be equally divided between John
Mourning, Sally Niffly, James Mourning, Daniel Mourning,
Samuel Mourning, and Nancy Mourning, in witness hereof
I do hereunto set my hand and seal this 20th of December
in the year of our Lord 1804.

In name of God Amen I Robert Black of the County
of Green and State of Kentucky being in a sick and feeble con-
dition of body, but of a perfect mind and memory and
knowing that is appointed for all men once to die: do
make this my last will and testament, Viz, first I commend
my soul to God who gave it, and my body to the earth
to be decently buried at the discretion of my Executors.

Item I will that my beloved wife Sarah have the use of my house
and household furniture together with a competent ^{support} ^{land}
now live on and likewise the service of the Boy named Wiley
toward so long as she shall live.

Item I give and bequeath
my land that I live on, together with all the work tools to my
son John as also the land that the said John is now in
possession of. Item I will and bequeath my sarel cott
my daughter Jane and likewise one cow that has been

named to her. Item I will that all the remainder of my
property (except so much corn and meat as is necessary for the
support of the family for the present year) be sold and equally
divided among my children, Moses, Abby, Peggy, and Polly (except
so much as will procure a good new cloak for my daughter
Jane) to be appropriated to the purpose of procuring books and
schooling their children. Item I will any service that may remain
of the above named Boy after the decease of my wife to my son
John, and likewise the plank that I have procured for the
purpose of furnishing my house, together with a note I have
upon William Sutton which he is to put to the use of
furnishing the house. Item I will that my daughter
have the liberty of living in the house with her mother
from costs so long as she may remain single. Lastly I do
and appoint my son John and my son in law John ^{whole}
whole and sole Executors to this my last will and testament.
