

I give and bequeath to my son John Easter, One Negro girl named Mary, One horse and saddle also one feather bed furniture, and five hundred dollars so soon as he becomes of lawful age or marries to him and his heirs forever. I give and bequeath to my daughter Mary Eliza two Negroes namely Amy and Mary Ann One horse and saddle and one feather bed furniture to her and her heirs forever. I give and bequeath to my son James Eliza One Negro boy named Rube and one equal undivided half of the tract of land I now live on, One horse and saddle and one feather bed and furniture to him and his heirs forever. I give and bequeath to my son Joseph Perry two Negroes Rachel and her child Harriet and the undivided half of the tract of land on which I now live also one horse and saddle and one feather bed and furniture to him and his heirs forever. It is to be understood that these infants require their portions until they arrive at lawful age or marries. It is my will that all and singular the residue of my property not heretofore specified (be it the death or intermarriage of my wife) equally divided among my five children as heretofore stated to them and their heirs forever. I bind unto my wife during her natural life or in default of the residue of my estate real and personal not heretofore given to be kept together with the infants children together for the purpose of nursing and educating said infants and further should either of the said infants predecease then the bequest of property herein to the said specified for them to receive it, that they shall be reimbursed out of the said residue as above mentioned provides to an equal division in such way and manner as my Executor and Executors shall think equitable and best. Lastly it is my will and desire and I hereby declare constitute and appoint my son in law Anthony Lambert and my wife Elizabeth my Executor and Executrix of this my last will and Testament. Proclamation
last will

In the name of God Amen. I William Gibson of Summers County and state of Kentucky, being of perfect sound memory, do hereby make this my last will and Testament hereby declaring and confirming the same. First I recommend my soul to that God from whence it came hoping in a full pardon of all its offences against his holy law and a full enjoyment of eternal felicity hereafter. Lastly - It is my desire that all my just debts be paid. I give my son Hugh Gibson nearly three acres of land lying on both creeks being the one half of the tract purchased of Sumner Denton and four Negroes by the name of Henry Andy, Nancy and Kitty and all my stock of horses, cattle, sheep & hogs and all my household and kitchen furniture except one bed and furniture and my crop that is now growing and all my penitential articles. Next - I give to my daughter Martha Pruitt two Negroes by the name of Betty and Hannah and two beds and furniture. Next - I give to my daughter Ellen Cantle One Negro by the name of Amy and her bed and furniture. Next - I give my son George McCormack Gibson One Negro by the name of portions and one bed and furniture and one horse saddle and bridle and one half of the money that is owing to me from Robert McCormack Esq. of Virginia. Next - I give to my grand daughter Elizabeth Pruitt the other half of my money that is in the hands of Robert McCormack Esq. of Virginia. I appoint my son Hugh Gibson my executor. Now under my hand and seal this twenty seventh day of August One thousand eight hundred and twenty two.

First it is my will that all my just debts be paid as soon as possible, for which purpose I do hereby appoint my friend Jacob Ball (of Vincennes and State of Indiana) and my brother William Hart (of Kentucky) Executors of this my last will and Testament giving to them or either of them the power to sell and Convey all or any part of my real and personal estate lying in the State of Indiana or Kentucky or elsewhere at such times, and in such manner as they or either of them shall think most beneficial to the parties concerned.

Secondly I wish them to pay unto Doct. William S. Webb of (Williamson County in the State of Tennessee the sum of Three hundred and thirty Dollars for money by him furnished me during my minority.

Thirdly I do give and bequeath unto my friend Jacob Ball, my big armchair and blanket and white bed quilt.

Fourthly I give unto my sister Susan Brown all my wearing Apparel.

And fifthly I give and bequeath and devise all the rest and residue of my estate, both real and personal and personal wherever the same may be found (After the payment of all my debts, and the distribution of the legacies aforesaid) unto my brother William Hart in trust for the use and benefit of the Children of my said sister Susan Brown, to be Applied at such times, and in such manner as he my said Brother (with the advice and consent of my said sister shall think most to the advantage and benefit of the said Children in Testimony whereof I have hereunto my hand and Seal this 17th day of December in the year of our Lord One thousand eight hundred and twenty two.
