 Henderson and State of Kentucky being weak in body and sick, but of sound
 mind and disposing memory, and calling to mind the uncertainty of human
 life and being desirous of disposing of such worldly estate as I am blessed with
 I give and bequeath the same in manner following, that is to say - I desire
 that so much of my estate be sold as may be necessary to pay all my just
 debts, and funeral expenses all of which debts & also my funeral expenses,
 I desire should be first paid out of the money arising from the sale of my
 estate as above directed, that is of my personal estate. Should my personal
 estate prove insufficient for the purpose above named, then I wish and desire
 that my interest in and to the lands of which my father died possessed may
 be sold, and so much of the money arising from the sale of said lands, be
 applied to the payment of the residue of my debts as may be necessary for
 that purpose - I wish and desire that my brother George Thomas B. Blay have

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 one hundred dollars allotted to him out of my estate after the payment of my
 debts as above named. I do give to Samuel G. Harbrow the sum of fifty dollars
 and to my sister Lucinda Green Blay fifty dollars. I hereby relinquish all my
 right and title, in and to a negro woman Diny, unto her husband, John Black and I
 give to the said negro woman Diny twenty dollars. I should have no property or
 money left, after paying my debts and funeral expenses as above directed and after
 paying the legacies above named, my will and desire is that the whole of it
 should be equally divided between Jonathan A. Blay, and Samuel G. Harbrow.

 that I James Glenn of this aforesaid State and County on the 15th day of
 November in the year of Lord one thousand eight hundred and forty six
 having labored under bodily afflictions and disease for some time, but of sound
 and disposing mind, memory and discretion, and knowing that it is appointed
 unto all men to die. I therefore make and ordain this my last Will and
 Testament, as follow, that I recommend my soul to God who gave it, and as to
 my worldly affairs I will and bequeath as follows - I appoint my beloved
 wife Elizabeth Glenn executrix of this my last will and Testament and there
 is to be no security required by the Court of the said Executrix. I will and bequeath
 unto my beloved wife Elizabeth Glenn after paying my just debts all of my
 property both real and personal during her natural life or widowhood to support
 her in raising a large and helpless family of children. I furthermore bequeath
 my beloved wife Elizabeth Glenn if she thinks it best to sell grant or convey
 two hundred and thirty four acres of land the tract or parcel of land upon
 which I now reside for the payment of my just debts, and the right by her given
 to be as valued as though I had conveyed the same myself and at her death
 I wish my property to be equally divided between my children. In Testimony

George Brown
 Will

I George Brown of the County of Henderson, and State of Kentucky do
 ordain this to be my last will and Testament. To my son Abraham Brown I
 confirm all gifts heretofore made and give him the debt I have paid for him
 toward to Nicholas Dixon one hundred & four dollars seventeen cents; &
 to John Board thirty three dollars and 90 cents and to John Board two dollars
 I give my daughter Wiley Dornier one hundred and five acres land on
 which she now lives, confirming to her all gifts heretofore made. I give
 to my daughter Mary Bugg one hundred acres land lying on each side
 adjoining the land belonging to the Estate of Philip Chaney also
 a narrow strip of land, not exceeding ten acres, extending from the one hundred
 acres to the Station Camp Spring, one cow and calf one third of my kitchen
 and table furniture, one third of my fowls of all description, one half my
 selling chairs, one horse of the value of forty dollars, a secretary and
 wardrobe, a breakfast table and the privilege of making a feather
 bed of the room on my farm. I give to my daughter Martha the balance
 of my land including my present residence, one horse of the value of forty
 dollars, two feather beds, bedsteads and furniture, one chair and stool
 two thirds of my kitchen and table furniture, two thirds of all my fowls,
 one walnut press or cupboard, one cherry bureau, one dining table, one
 set silver tea spoons, one silver ladle, one side saddle, a spoke of young
 a mule or two oxen, one half my selling chairs, and my family bible.
 To my Grand daughter Olivia Hall I give my feather bed, bedstead and
 furniture. To George G. Seefeld I give one dollar. James F. Seefeld
 shall have six months schooling and the privilege of raising himself a
 horse on my farm. My Grand son Francis M. Seefeld shall have
 six months schooling and the privilege of raising a horse on my farm.
 I give my Grand daughter Amanda Seefeld twenty dollars. To Mary
 Seefeld I give the like sum of twenty dollars. For the purpose of paying my
 just debts and some of the foregoing legacies, my Executor shall sell me
 a credit of twelve months, the purchaser giving bond with personal
 security, a tract of land containing fifty acres more or less in which
 Samuel C. Atkinson now resides, and a negro man named Preston.
 All of my property not included in the foregoing items, shall be sold
 by my Executor, the proceeds of which together with any monies which may
 remain in his hands after the payment of my debts and the foregoing legacies
 shall be equally divided between my children. I appoint my son Abraham
 Brown my Executor and in consequence of relinquishing my claims against
 him mentioned in the first item of this will, believe that he will execute this
 last will and Testament without charging any thing for so doing. In testimony

In the name of God amen, I Nicholas Brown of the County of
 Henderson and State of Kentucky, being of sound mind, but weak in body
 infirmities, do make this my last will and Testament as follows to wit.
 Item I leave to my beloved wife Mary the tract of land upon which
 I reside, together with all my stock of horses, cattle, hogs, farming
 utensils, Crop of Corn, household & kitchen furniture, also her choice
 of fowls of my slaves, with the privilege of the fifth should she desire
 it, and my desire is that she keep the remaining five of my running
 negroes during her natural life, and until they are able to support
 themselves, My children are to pay her annually, the appraised value of
 maintaining and cloathing them, to be fixed by an agent chosen by herself
 and as they become fit for service, she or her agent is to hire them out & the
 money arising therefrom to be applied to the maintenance of the negroes and
 and the increase of the women should there be any, and should the
 proceeds of hire of the young amount to more than a support for the
 negro or younger, she may at discretion pay it over to my children.
