Seventh: I do constitute and appoint my Brother-in-law Thomas Blake sole executor of this my last will and testament, and my will is that I do expressly declare that my said executor shall not be charged with or accountable for more of the said said money or money estate than he shall actually receive or shall come to his hands by virtue of this my last will, or with or for any loss which shall happen of this said money or estate as as such loss happen with out his will, fault, neglect, and request.
