Will  
I, C. W. Davis of the County of Henderson and State of Kentucky being in feeble health, but of sound mind and disposing Manly do make and ordain this my last Will and Testament.

First: I give to my wife Martha A. Davis, One hundred and forty Acres of Land including the residence her life time, to be cut off of the tract by a line running parallel with the line of Mrs. M. W. Stone and all of my personal property, after paying my debts. - Second: I give to my son Robt. A. Davis the One Thousand Dollars of Notes Executed by W. H. Davis for land. Third: I give to my son W. H. Davis One thousand Dollars in the land conveyed to him by me and which has been deducted from the price of the Land, in making the deed - and which, consequently he has already received. Fourth: I give to my son J. J. Davis One hundred acres of land, to be cut off next to the Creek, and one Acre. Fifth: I give to my son R. E. Davis One hundred acres of land, including the dwelling after the death of his Mother Martha A. Davis to be cut off of the tract by a line parallel with the line of Mrs. M. W. Stone, and a Acre and a half and one Cord. Sixth: I give to my Grandson, R. N. Haynes the remainder of the Land between the land of my son J. J. Davis and my son R. E. Davis Forty acres of which he will not get possession of until the death of his Grand Mother Martha A. Davis. I have heretofore helped my sons R. A. Davis, W. H. Davis, and my daughter now deceased, Mary C. Haynes, but have endeavored to equalize them all in this

my last Will. I now appoint my wife Martha A. Davis to execute this my last will, and request the County Court, not to require her to give any security on her bond. In Testimony I have affixed my name and Called Witnesses May 3<sup>rd</sup> 1880. The above and foregoing bequels to J. J. Davis, R. E. Davis and R. N. Haynes is upon the express Condition that they release to each other their interest in the One hundred and Sixty acres remainder Land, May 3<sup>rd</sup> 1880. C. W. Davis
