My youngest daughter I desire should be given to my sister
Rebecca Radman.

My youngest son David E. Sells I desire
should go to live with John Radman son of Thomas Radman

I desire that William Cooper and Robert
M. Miller be my Executors to this my last will and testament
and Witness whereof I have here set my hand and seal this
9th day of July 1827.
