

In the name of the Father, Amen. I, John C. Smith, of the State of Kentucky, being of sound mind and disposing memory, do hereby certify that I have made and published this my last will and testament in the form following, To wit: It is my will that all my great estate, both real and personal, after my decease, and my funeral expenses, be paid to my executors as soon as possible. And give to my son Benjamin a sum of three hundred and twenty dollars, to be paid to him when he comes to him and for which he gave me his note bearing date the 1st day of 1819, which sum and the interest due thereon, together with the sum of 150 acres of land conveyed to him by deed in the full of his right of my real and personal estate. Item I give to my son John a sum of one hundred and eight dollars, which I lent him at different times and for which I hold his note, one for five dollars, dated the 1st day of July 1815, the other for four dollars dated the 1st day of January 1816, which sum and the interest due thereon together with the sum of 150 acres conveyed to him by deed is to be considered as the full of my real and personal estate. Item I give to the children of my son Benjamin, to wit: that tract of land in which they and their mother were living in Jefferson County on Floyd's Creek containing one hundred and ten acres to them and their heirs and assigns forever. And if any of the children should die without lawful issue his share of said land should fall to the surviving children. Item I have given to my son Benjamin, who died in his life time a tract of land in Henry County containing 130 acres which I bought of Benjamin Sebastian for the

Friederich deceased in his life gave a tract of land in Henry County
containing 130 acres which I bought of Benjamin Sebastian for one
and two thirds which said Joseph sold in his life time and which
the children of the said Joseph have to consider as the full share to
which their father is entitled out of my estate. Item. I have given to
my daughter Margaret at the time when she was married to Thomas
Moore one negro man named William and for whom I paid the
hundred dollars. I further gave to said Thomas at one time three
hundred dollars and on the 3rd of this instant two hundred dollars
in part pay for a tract of land on which said Thomas now lives
making in the whole seven hundred dollars and which said sum
to be considered as her full share out of my estate. Item. To William
interrmarried with my daughter Christina I have paid on the 3rd day
June 1817 the sum of six hundred and ninety dollars 18^{cts}. which
was considered and agreed to by said Pearce to be his full share
his wife's portion out of my estate and for which he signed an agree-
ment of writing for that purpose which will be found amongst my
papers. Item. I give to my son Jacob Frederick one negro man
named Sam, being the same I bought of him, also the five hundred
of \$671.75 cts, which sum he borrowed of me at two different times.
Now noted dated the 11th day of March 1818 for \$371.75 cts, the note
dated the 18th of March 1818 for five hundred and twenty dollars
Locke and Frederick due by Jacob Frederick for 2500 before
will be found amongst my papers and be delivered to him.
Item. I give to my grand children Frederick and Augustus
being the children of my son Jacob Frederick and
each of them the sum of one hundred dollars.

One note dated the 11th day of March 1818 for \$376.75 cts and
dated the 18th of March 1818 for \$295 and a note assigned to
Lockwood Frederick due by the subscribers for George's farm
will be found amongst my papers and be delivered to him
Item I give to my grand children Elizabeth and Benjamin
being the children of my son Frederick the order each of them
each of them the sum of \$500 dollars
Item I give to my grand children William and
Susan the sum of \$500 dollars each
Item I give to my grand children Mary and
John the sum of \$500 dollars each

At a County Court held for Jefferson County at
the Court house in Louisville on the nineteenth day of February the third
and eight hundred and twenty seven.

The foregoing instrument of
writing was produced in Court and proved by the oaths of John
Miller and Thomas Maddis the subscribing witnesses thereto and
thereupon the same was established by the Court to be the last will
and testament of Augustus Fredericks Senior deceased and ordered to
be recorded and is recorded. And on the motion of Samuel Fredericks
of the Executors therein named who made oath according to law
the execution of the said was granted him and who thereupon gave
bond with Benjamin Lawrence his security in the penalty of six thou-
sand dollars conditioned according to law.
