

In the name of God Amen, I George Seibert being weak in  
but of sound and disposing mind and memory and considering  
the the uncertainty of life and all earthly things, do make and  
publish this my last will and testament  
First: I bequeath my immortal soul to God who gave it and desire  
that whatever I may be justly indebted at my death shall be paid  
and discharged in the manner herein after directed.  
Second: I bequeath and devise the land on which I now live, consisting  
of One hundred and sixty acres to my son Amos, which land I  
hold under two deeds, One for One hundred and ten acres and  
the other for fifty acres, and do also will and bequeath to my said  
son my interest and claim to three hundred and fifty acres  
of land adjoining my plantation above devised and lying on  
the South Side of Chenoweth Run, for which I held the bond  
of M L Miller and which I have for a valuable Consideration  
assigned to my said son, hereby confirming, willing and desi-  
ring that the title be made to him. And I do further bequeath  
and devise to my said son my waggon, gear and tackle as well as  
all my farming utensils and stock of horses, cattle, sheep and  
hogs. And I do further bequeath and devise to my said son my  
negro woman Slave for life named Leticia; reserving however  
from the foregoing bequests the support of myself and my wife,  
the mother of said Amos the remainder of our days and the  
payment of my medical bills and those of his said mother and  
any and all other necessary charges or debts which may be due  
to me either now or for the comfort of myself or wife hereafter

any and all other necessaries for myself or wife or children  
from me either now or for the comfort of my family  
Also reserving the sum of Two hundred dollars which I devise and  
bequeath to my son John who is now and has been for many years  
absent, should he ever call for it, which my said son Amos is to  
pay to him on the application of my said son John in Specie,  
Also reserving the sum of One hundred and fifty dollars in  
Specie, which together with a like sum now in the hands of my son  
George, making three hundred dollars, which I bequeath and devise  
to the use and benefit of my daughter Mary Welch who is  
married with James Welch, which sum of three hundred dollars  
in Specie is to be laid out by my said son in the purchase of a  
negro woman for my said daughter Mary Welch for her use and  
the use of her heirs  
Third. I bequeath to my son George any and all right, title, inter-  
est or claims which I might or could have to the tract of land  
on which he lives for or on account of any money which he  
received from me to assist in the payment of said land. And  
it is my will and devise that he be released and exonerated  
from the payment thereof, except the One hundred and fifty dollars  
which is directed to be added to a like sum to be paid by my  
son Amos to the use of their Sister Mary Welch, making together  
three hundred dollars to be appropriated to the purchase of a  
negro woman for her use and benefit And upon that bequest being  
complied with, I devise that the said George be fully acquitted  
thereof. It is my will and I devise that my daughter Betsey  
shall be paid and receive the sum of the remainder of my

Also reserving the sum of One hundred and fifty dollars  
Specie, which together with a like sum now in the hands of my son  
George, making three hundred dollars, which I bequeath and devise  
to the use and benefit of my daughter Mary Welch who inter-  
married with James Welch, which sum of three hundred dollars  
in specie is to be laid out by my said son in the purchase of a  
negro woman for my said daughter Mary Welch for her use and  
the use of her heirs.

Third. I bequeath to my son George any and all right, title, inter-  
est or claim which I might or could have to the tract of land  
on which he lives for or on account of any money which he  
received from me to assist in the payment of said land. And  
it is my will and devise that he be released and exonerated  
from the payment thereof, except the One hundred and fifty dollars  
which is directed to be added to a like sum to be paid by my  
son James to the use of their sister Mary Welch, making together  
three hundred dollars to be appropriated to the purchase of a  
negro woman for her use and benefit And upon that bequest being  
complied with, I devise that the said George be fully acquitted  
thereof. It is my will and I desire that my daughter Peter  
in her married with A. Brown, shall be paid and receive the sum  
of One hundred and fifty dollars out of the remainder of my estate  
at the death of her mother my beloved wife to whom I bequeath  
my household and kitchen furniture, after payment of my debts.

sum of One hundred and fifty dollars to my said daughter  
to be by her disposed of among her three daughters, Having also  
provided for and given an ample portion to my daughter Mary  
who intermarried with David Evingson.  
Lastly I hereby appoint my sons George and Amos Executors  
this my last will and testament, In witness whereof I have in  
the presence of three witnesses affixed my hand and seal the  
17 April 1824
