memory do constitute and ordain this instrument as my
last and testament.

First: It is my will and desire that my wife Polly have the use and
benefit of the farm on which I now live until my children (namely
James and Nathan) are of age for the purpose of assisting
her in raising and educating them. The farm here alluded to is
located on the South East by a drain at short distance above
house where Samuel Pharis now lives, the land on the side of the
South West is excepted, to be otherwise disposed of.

After all my children are of age it is my will that my wife
have the use and benefit of One third of the land above alluded
including the dwelling house during her natural life, or in other
words the two fields adjoining the Barn to include the Orchard
a field adjoining the Stable. It is my desire that my daughter
Elizabeth live with her mother so long as she remains unmarried and
to have the same benefit as the children under age.

I do give and bequeath to my daughter Elizabeth Terry one
part of the farm called the Robb farm, described as follows.

Beginning at the intersection of the upper Spring branch
the branch that passes near a Stone Spring House, thence to a
Perrimon tree on the North West side of said farm, thence to a
Ash tree where Samuel Pharis fence crosses the line to the mouth
of a small branch fifteen or twenty yards above said Ash tree
said branch to a Maple tree.

said branch to a Maple, thence to Mrs Dawson's line in the
last course or direction of the branch, thence with Mrs Dawson's line to
the Creek, thence with my line and Mrs Dawson's up the Creek as
far as the land extends in that direction, thence Westwardly to
Black tree standing near the Upper Spring, thence with the
Spring branch to the beginning.

Item 3rd To my daughter Margaret I give and bequeath the balance
of the Robb farm and twenty five acres more on the line of the Robb
farm where Thomas McLawley now lives.

Item 4th To my daughter Sally Terry I give and bequeath so much
of my land as lies in the following description viz Beginning at
an Ash tree where Samuel Thar's fence crosses the Creek, thence
along the trees standing on a small branch, thence parallel
with the fence on the right fifty poles to a stake, thence a west-
wardly course so as to include the place where Joseph Terry
lives reaching the Robb line, thence with said line to Ash
McLawley's corner in said line, thence to the Creek and up
said branch to the beginning.

Item 5th To my three sons (viz) Samuel, James and Arthur I give
and bequeath each an equal portion of my estate both real
and personal as is not disposed of above except so much of
my lands as may be necessary for the convenience of
raising the children and carrying on the farm
with such furniture and farming utensils as may be
necessary. That in disposing of personal estate I may discharge
any and all debts or claims.

Section 3rd. To my daughter Margaret I give and bequeath the balance of the Robb farm and twenty five acres more on the line of the Robb farm where Thomas McCawley now lives.

Item 4th. To my daughter Sally Terry I give and bequeath so much of my lands as lies in the following description viz Beginning at a large Ash tree where Samuel Phares fence crosses the Creek, thence to a large bottom tree standing on a small branch, thence parallel with the fence on the right fifty poles to a stake, thence a well nearly closed so as to include the place where Joseph Terry lives reaching the Knob line, thence with said line to North McCawley's corner in said line, thence to the Creek and thence back to the Beginning

Item 5th. To my three sons (viz) Samuel, James and Arthur I give and bequeath each an equal portion of my estate both real and personal as is not disposed of above except so much of the same as may be necessary for the convenience and support of my wife in raising the children and carrying on the farm and such furniture and farming utensils as may be necessary. Whatever disposable personal estate I may die possessed of I give and bequeath to my wife or whatever debt or money may be due me, my wife or children may be at the discretion of Executors hereafter named to be paid to the benefit of my love above named children.
