

I Nicholas Stowers of Jefferson County and State of Kent
being sick and weak, but of sound mind and memory do make
and declare this my last will and testament revoking all other
wills heretofore to make, First, I give and bequeath to my wife Fanny Stowers
during her widowhood all my negroes, horses, cattle, hogs, sheep, wag-
gons, plantation utensils, household and kitchen furniture together
with one hundred acres of land to be layed off by a line to be run
parallel to a line of an hundred acres of land sold by me to
Nicholas Mc Lewis, the said hundred acres of land to include the
houses in which I now live together with the crops that may be on
the farm at my decease, and it is further my will and desire
that should my wife Fanny Stowers marry again, that she will
then have only such part of my estate as she will be entitled to
by law. And that all my just debts are to be paid out of the per-
centage of the property devised to my wife Fanny Stowers
Item 2nd I give and bequeath to my son William Stowers to him and
his heirs forever the residue of the tract of land whereon I now live
supposed to be one hundred acres after laying off the hundred acres
devised to my wife by the said residue more or less, the said land
adjoining Robt. A. Miller, Stansberry and Nicholas Mc Lewis
Item 3rd I give and bequeath to my daughter Barbara Wainsley
at the death of my wife Fanny one fourth of the stocks of horses,
cattle, sheep, hogs, waggers, plantation utensils and household and
kitchen furniture to her and her heirs forever
Item 4th I give and bequeath to my son Patrick Stowers to him

Kitchen furniture to wit and her heirs forever.
Item 4th I give and bequeath to my son Patrick Starns to him
and his heirs forever. One hundred acres of land before devised
to my wife Nancy Starns to be received by him when ever the
term of this said legacy to my wife Nancy ceases. Also one negro boy named
Dan of Dutch under the same incumbrance of the land. Item 5th I give & bequeath to my daughter Polly Banks at the death of my
son a negro which may be a boy or girl not less than twelve years old to be of the family of Dutch or Lucy or a Consideration equal to
what there not be a negro of the said description to her and heirs forever. Item 6th I give & bequeath to my daughter Elizabeth Starns
of my wife a negro which may be a boy or girl not less than twelve years old of the family of Dutch or Lucy or a Consideration or money equal to
what there not be a negro of said description to her & her heirs forever. Item 7th I give & bequeath to my three daughters Lucy Starns, Sally Starns
Malinda Starns to them & their heirs forever to be equally divided at the death of my wife a portion of the bequest made to her all along
with their increase except the share devised to Patrick, Polly & Elizabeth, the stock of every description, plantation assets, household
Kitchen furniture & every other property I possess not before devised to be equally divided between the four above named children Polly Banks, Lucy, Sally & Malinda
Starns, but it is to be understood that the legacy left to my daughters, Polly Banks & Elizabeth Starns is to be exempted from the negroes former
partition except the one devised to Patrick should there not be such as I have devised them. Item 8th And whereas I have given to my sons Eliza & John
Starns & my daughter Francis Starns & Nancy Starns certain property which I possess them & their heirs forever and the four last named children are to be
barred from any partition in any property I may be possessed of & it is my will & desire that my son Patrick Starns & my friends Thomas Starns
W. Davis & Samuel Taylor should act as my Executors. In Witness Whereof I have hereunto set my hand & affixed my seal this 5th day of March 1816

Storing, but it is to be understood that the legacy left to my daughters, Polly Banks & Elizabeth Storing is to be taken from the negroes former
partition except the one devised to Patrick should there not be such as I have devised them. Item 8th And whereas I have given to my sons Charles & Daniel
to my daughters Francis Storing & Nancy Storing certain property which I confirm to them & their heirs forever and the four last named children are
barred from any partitions in any property I may be possessed of & it is my will & desire that my son Daniel Storing & my friends Thomas Storing
W. Lewis & Hancock Taylor should act as my Executors - In Witness Whereof I have hereunto my hand & affixed my seal this 5th day of March 1816
