

In the name of God

I Richard Jones Waters of Jefferson County of sound and disposing mind, memory and understanding, do make and ordain this my last will and Testament Viz Comprimis. I will that a fair and equitable settlement be made with my friend Thomas Nicholson accounting to him for the sales of between 30 and 40 barrels of good flour, four or five damaged ones, also a barrel and keg of whiskey, also sundry dried peaches and apples sold for him in 1787 and for the sales of his share of a small cargo of goods arrived at Louisville in December last, also for the sales of some part of a few guns, do, buttangs, left with by said Nicholson in 1787. Of these with a statement of the sales, I will leave a full account among my papers for the information of my Executors, for those parts of the sales which may be sold for cash. I expect the cash will be paid Mr Nicholson immediately or as soon as possible and for those sold for trade, I expect he will accept trade allowing me for the storage and commissions at the rate of ten per cent.

Item. My will and desire is that great regard be paid to my friends and partner Daniel Broadhead Junr of this place. I have taken a bill of sale for all his property in this district as the bill will shew and taken the stock of goods into my possession. I also expect a quantity of goods to be consigned to me by him this fall and also to receive sundry debts and make sundry collections for him in this district all of which will be done in such a manner as if my own property, for the purpose of evading the hungry and eager grasps of merciless men, who from a long series of misfortunes to my said friends have obtained an ascendancy and would without this step

ting for the sales of all that may be sold and realizing every  
such above mentioned bills of sales after such accounts being  
rendered. First be paid and satisfied the balance that may be  
found due me, by which will be found by examining a bill
