The following is the substance of what we suppose to be the last will and testament of Thomas Theobalds deceased left as a particular request for us to attend to in case of his death, First - that an immediate application should be made to the County Court (at his expense) to obtain a Bill of Divorcement for his niece Nancy Pendergrass from her absconded husband John Bayler and that she should have the bed and bedding which she occupied at his house. Second - And that the said Nancy Pendergrass shall receive from the interest of his estate a subsistence while she remains single. 3rd - That he wished his lawful debts paid from the money arising from the sale of his crop, stock, household furniture and farming utensils. And the surplus to be applied equally to the benefit of his children. 4th - That his negroes should be hired out for the support of his children until his youngest child arrived at full age and then it was his desire that his negro man Marry should be set free and the balance equally divided between his children; but in case all his children should die without issue.

The following is the substance of what we suppose to be the last will and testament of Thomas Theobalds deceased left as a particular request for us to attend to in case of his death, First. That an immediate application should be made to the County Court (at his expense) to obtain a Bill of Divorcement for his wife Nancy Pendergrass from her absconded Husband John Bayler and that she should have the kept and bedding which she occupied at his house.
Second. And that the said Nancy Pendergrass shall receive from the interest of his estate a subsistence while she remains single.
3rd - That he wished his lawful debts paid from the money arising from the sale of his crop, stock, household furniture and farming utensils, And the surplus to be applied equally to the benefit of his children.
4th - That his negroes should be hired out for the support of his children until his youngest child arrived at full age and then it was his desire that his negro man Harry should be set free and the balance equally divided between his children; but in case all his children should die without lawful issue, it was his desire that his negro woman Cleo should also be set free.
5th - He also stated that he had heretofore made a will which was in the hands of his brother and which he wished to be void.
