I William Kearney of the County of Jefferson and State of Kentucky do make this my last will and testament thereby revoking all wills by me heretofore made I give to my beloved wife Sarah Kearney and William Kearney my plantation whereon I now live, Charles a negro slave, a wagon, gear and three horses.

It is my wish after the death of my wife that the said property herein before mentioned, to be the said William Kearney's - do do he may think proper forever.

I give to my beloved son James Kearney a negro slave by the name of Jacob forever and one of my horses after William Kearney has taken choice of three.

It is my wish that a negro boy by the name of Phillip shall remain on the farm until my son Robert Morris Kearney shall be free from his apprenticeship after that time William Kearney is to pay four hundred dollars to Susan Kearney, Sarah Bevin, Ann Kearney and Robert Morris Kearney each twenty five dollars for four years then the said Phillip to belong to William Kearney forever.

I give to my beloved daughter Susan Kearney a negro girl by the name of Mary forever.

It is my wish that my and my wife's both slaves remain the property of my wife until after her death then sold or divided between my three

Lucy and Matilda both slaves remain the property of my wife
until after her death then sold or divided between my three
daughters Susan Kearney, Sarah Birin and Ann Kearney
but I hereby empower my Executors or either of them to sell the
said Lucy and Matilda at any time during the life of my
wife on condition of their purchasing others of equal value in
place of the said Lucy and Matilda and that the slaves so pur-
chased shall belong to my wife during her natural life and
after her death to be equally divided between my three
daughters Susan Kearney, Sarah Birin and Ann Kearney

I give to my beloved wife and William Kearney
all my household and kitchen furniture and stock of
every description and farming utensils during her life not
herein before disposed of and afterwards to be equally divided be-
tween my children James Kearney, William Kearney, Robert Morris
Kearney, Susan Kearney, Sarah Birin and Ann Kearney. Also five
hundred acres of land in Hopkins County Kentucky, One lot
in Shippingport, which tract of land and lot I hereby empower
my Executors or either of them to sell and divide the money
equally between my children James Kearney, Robert Morris
Kearney, Susan Kearney, Mary Wells, Sarah Birin and Ann
Kearney.

I appoint my sons John Kearney and William
Kearney Trustees to my said daughter Mary Wells to hold
the part I have devised to her in trust for the benefit of her-
self and her children and employ it as they think most bea-

purporting to be the last will and testament of William Hearnley
decd was produced in Court and proved to be such by the oaths
of John N Gibbs and David Gamsley subscribing witnesses there
to and ordered to be recorded.

And on the motion of John Hearnley
and William Hearnley the Executors named in the said will
execution of the said will is granted them, Whereupon they
gave bonds in the penalty of five thousand dollars with Thomas
Goyes their security conditioned according to law.

to and ordered to be recorded.

And on the motion of John Kearney
and William Kearney, the Executors named in the said will
execution of the said will is granted them, Whereupon they
gave bond in the penalty of five thousand dollars with Thomas
Boyes their security conditioned according to law.
