State of Kentucky being... a feeble state of body but in perfect soundness
of mind and memory make this my last will - I first commit my soul to
God hoping in his mercy through Christ and my body to be decently buried
by my family. What little worldly property God in his kind providence
has been pleased to give me I wish to be disposed of in the following
manner. What debts I may owe to be paid. After my debts are paid
all my property real and personal to be in the hands and under the
management of my dear Wife Anna while she lives and at her death
to be divided among my children viz Margaret, Sarah, Thomas, Samuel, William

Anna, Narcissa, & Harriet, James & I have an equal share with the Orestes
hereafter mentioned. To my daughter Sarah I have given a good saddle which I
allow her to have and also twenty dollars besides her equal share at her mother's death.
The said twenty dollars to be paid her at any time after my death when my wife
her mother may think she needs it. To my daughter Margaret when she was
married I gave a cow worth ten dollars, a calf worth ten dollars, five heads
of sheep worth seven dollars and fifty cents and one bed and furniture worth
seventeen dollars, the whole amounting to forty four dollars and fifty cents, which
forty four dollars and fifty cents is to be deducted from my said daughter Margaret's
share at her mother's death. To my son Thomas I have given a calf worth thirty
dollars, which thirty dollars is to be deducted from his share at his mother's death.
To my son Samuel I gave a horse worth thirty dollars, a saddle worth sixteen
dollars, a heifer worth eight dollars, a sow worth one dollar and a bed and
furniture worth twenty three dollars, the whole making seventy eight
dollars, which seventy eight dollars is to be deducted from his share at his
mother's death. I allow my wife to be at liberty to give to any of my chil-
dren when they may in her opinion need it any part the value not exceed-
ing the amount of what may be their equal share at their mother's death.
