In the name of God, Amen, I Walter Cunningham
of the County of Jepsonine and State of
Kentucky, being very weak, and infirm
in body, but perfect and sound in
mind and memory, and calling in mind
that it is appointed for all men once to
die, do therefore make this my last Will
and Testament. And first of all I give my
soul to the almighty God who gave it
to me, hoping to receive the same again
at the general resurrection, through the
mighty power of Christ my Redeemer
and my body I recommend to the earth
to be buried, in a decent and Christianlike
manner at the discretion of my Executors.
And touching such worldly estates as it has
pleased God to bless me with in this life,
I give and bequeath the same in man-
ner and form following (To wit) I allow
all my just debts to be paid out of
my moveable property, or the debts that
is due to me. And I bequeath to Robert
Lowrey, and my Daughter Mary his wife

that tract of Land whereon they now live con-
taining one hundred and five acres to them
their heirs or assigns forever, I bequeath to
William Drake and my daughter Agnes
his wife, that tract of Land which was sur-
veyed for them by John Lowrey containing
one hundred and five acres to them their
heirs or assigns forever. I bequeath to my
daughter Hannah one hundred acres of Land to
be laid out and to include the improve-
ment whereon Thomas Rhidens now lives.
But not to extend further northeast than
to Drake's line that lies next to it, to his
heirs or assigns forever, and I bequeath
to my Daughter Isabella one hundred acres
of Land to be laid out along my southwest
line from where my daughter Hannah's line ter-
minates, to the corner that is next to Jeremiah
Perins, But by no means to include the
spring that is near Mount Moriah, mak-
ing thereof, keeping at least ten poles clear
of that spring to her, and her heirs for-
ever. I bequeath to my son John Cunningham
all the rest of my Land that is my pro-
perty forever, with this proviso, that is re-
serving to my wife Jean Cunningham his
mother, the possession of the mansion house
and half the cleared land, during her
natural life, and at her death to revert
to him or his heirs forever, and I allow
that as soon as money can be raised or
recovered from that suit I have against
Thomas Rhinead, therewith to purchase
a negro girl and that my wife shall
have the use of her with the one half
of negro Isaac's time during his natural
life and then they are to revert to my son
John Cunningham forever. I bequeath to my
