In the Name of God Amen I Samuel Sodusky do make and ordain this my last will and Testament in the manner and form following First I do hereby direct and empower my Executor hereinafter mentioned to sell the land whereon I now live and also my stock of every description house hold and kitchen furniture for the best price that can be had and on such terms as my Executor hereafter mentioned shall deem best except that my two Daughters Katurah and Elizabeth shall have it in their power to keep the two horses and their Saddles at their valuation which horses they claim as theirs and also Jacob Sodusky my son is to have my third horse. And the money arising from the sale of my said estate except as before excepted I hereby give to my three Daughters and Grand daughter (nephew) Hannah Elizabeth Sally and grand daughter Betsy Severston an equal division of the money & all other money that I may inherit except the two sum of fifteen pounds each which by agreement with my sons Andrew Anthony John & Jacob where to be given by my 2^d sons to their sisters, which two sum of fifteen pounds being unpaid by John Anthony amounting to thirty pounds is to be divided between my three daughters Andrew Sodusky having paid to his sister Betsy Severston mother to my 2^d Grand daughter the sum due from him & I do hereby direct that my son Jacob shall be exonerated from the payment of the fifteen pounds

which was to be paid by him to his sisters and whereas my said daughter Galy Sevenster did receive in advance property after her marriage, to near the value of twelve pounds. I do hereby deduct that sum from my saids grand daughters proportion of the money which she might be intitled to but if my said grand daughter should die without heir or before she arrives to the age of twenty one years old in that case her proportion of the money to be equally divided between my three daughters before mentioned whereas I am intitled to four sevenths of a negro man Alexander by marriage with Margaret Hornbach and the said Margrets three younger children having a right to three sevenths of said negro I do hereby leave intrust for the benefit of saids Negro my four sevenths in the hands of my Brother Jacob Lodushy provided however if the said heirs of my said wife Margaret should be intitled to any heir during the time he has been in my possession in that case the said four sevenths of the sale of s^d negro shall be subject to the payment of such heir. I do hereby appoint my Brother Jacob Lodushy my executor to this my last will and Testament revoking all others In testimony whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal this 1st day of April 1803.

I give and bequeath to my grand son James Anderson one negro fellow named Billy to him and his heirs forever. 3^d I give and bequeath to my dearly beloved daughter Mary Cartmill and her heirs forever one negro man named Cumberland and a negro woman named Befney Also one leather bed and furniture and half of my stock of horses and cattle. 4th I give to my dearly beloved son James Cogger all the household and kitchen furniture (except what a box given to my two Daughters) to him and his heirs forever. Be it remembered agreeably to the last will and Testament of my deceased husband Michael Cogger all the debts due from his estate was to be paid out of the part given me it is also my will and desire if any debts shall come against the estate of my deceased husband such as must be paid agreeably to law they shall be paid in an equal manner agreeably or in proportion
