Jesse Midway and relief of Lewis Tappan her dower in the personal
estate of her deceased husband and beg leave to submit the following
is their allotment of said dower

One third of the money arising from sale of property do to &
after pay^t of dues &c they find to be \$396.10 and
which is all that her former husband owned at the time of his death

By the appraisement of the slaves we find their aggregate
to be \$450.00 and that Jack, Lucy, Susan, and Sarah are all grown
Machine fitted to be sold as her dower in the slave, and to the sum of \$1550.00

Which sum lacks 30 dollars in value of being paid to the
value of the slaves, we have therefore given said dower credit on
the settlement of her debt as above for the equivalent of said sum
in Committal Paper the settlement of which is kept by myself
submitted by

and weak but no perfect sense and memory I make this my last will and testa-
ment utterly denying any thing denying all other wills with my free will made
I give my soul to god that give me me and my body to the earth to be buried at
the discretion of my Ex^{rs} hereafter named and my will is that I give
as follows I give to my beloved sister Susan Jane Poley and to my
beloved to be equally divided between them both I give my beloved
Nancy Pitcher and I give my flat iron and side saddle to
Susan and Nancy the money due in Brother Lewis Pitchers hand is

to be divided between Susan and Nancy. Now I leave my chest and chair to Patsy. Now I leave to Thomas & John my house after he pays out of the house my sick bed and funeral expenses. The rest I leave to Brother John. After it makes untill him to wear it. Now I leave my quilt to Betsy Johnson. Now I leave to Susan. To Patsy my glass. I shall then give all my Brothers two dollars a piece. Brother Charles. Brother Lewis. Brother Thomas. And James. Patsy when collected out of the hands of Sister John. Patsy. I constitute and appoint my beloved brother John Patsy executor of this my last will and testament and in doing whereof I have set hand and seal this twenty third day of April 1825.

As it is remembered that I David C. Patsy of Jefferson County & State of Kentucky being in weak state of body but of sound mind do make and ordain this my last will & testament in the manner and form following. Now it is my will that my son James shall have that part of my farm beginning on the line of Presley Talbot at the north west corner of the plantation on which my son David C. Patsy now lives thence running with the fence of said David a straight line until it intersect my line of fence next to said David thence westwardly with said fence to its intersection with a crop fence separating corn from oats thence with said crop fence southwardly a right line to the line between my land and John H. Hollenbeck's place now all that part of my farm and land westwardly of said dividing line and adjoining to the land of Butts H. Hollenbeck's place. Also to my son Presley Talbot & John Whip I will to my said son James to have and his heirs forever. I also will to my said son James one negro boy Bill, my wagon and gear two horses. That is the one now called bird and the other to be chosen by him. and this is the portion which I allow him out of my estate. It is to be distinctly understood as my will that my daughter Mary Pleasant. Nancy. Margaret & Ann shall have the right to make and direct any house their houses untill they marry or voluntarily chose to quit it. To my son David I hereby give all that part of my farm and land eastwardly of the aforesaid dividing line and adjoining the land of Butts H. Hollenbeck's place. Potters. Marfield & Co. Presley Talbot to him and his heirs forever. The remainder of my estate real and personal after the payment of my just debts and funeral expenses I do divide between my children John Patsy Pleasant, James. Betsy. Susan. Rebecca. Margaret. Peggy & Ann. Robert & David. It is my will that they & Ann are each to have a horse their children two cows, two beds & their furniture and a bureau. And I do hereby account therefore my father's unearned children having for them

articles than his had estate to be divided among the said children equally after the following ones accounting for the several items advanced to them by me viz. John. Six hundred & twenty four dollars 75¢ Robert same hundred & eighty five dollars. A heavy blanket one hundred and an eighteen dollars 50 cents. Betsy three hundred & fifty dollars. Margaret Blaggett three hundred dollars & David one hundred dollars. And the amount of the said hereby given to him at ten dollars per acre. It is my will and desire that in making the aforesaid division my negroes may be divided in kind or sold which ever mode may give most satisfaction to my children who are interested in them may be divided by them. It is further my will and desire that the crop on hand at my house be kept for the use of my family. I hereby appoint Robert H. Patsy and John Perry executors of this my last will and testament hereby revoking all former wills. In testimony whereof I have hereunto set my hand and affixed my seal the 27 day July in the year of our Lord 1825.
