In the name of God. Amen. I Jacob Sodowsky being advanced  
in age and my health being much impaired but perfectly sound both  
in mind and memory do make and establish this my last will and  
testament. Item I give and bequeath to my beloved wife Elizabeth  
during her natural life the following property (town) One hundred  
and fifty acres of land so as to include secure all the improvements  
where I now live and to commence at the corner of my son James Sodow-  
sky's lot and to land on the One hundred acres I intend giving him  
and his children in this will hereafter to be mentioned, and to be laid off  
in the most suitable form so as to include the 150 acres. and if any thing  
should happen my daughter Rebecca's husband and children are to have  
seventy five acres of the land allotted to my wife immediately. I also  
give to my wife two negro men namely Paris & Isaac, Jenny and her five  
children, Mary, Eliza, Malinda, Abby and Henry all during her natural  
life. I give also to my beloved wife Elizabeth my carriage and such  
stores of her choice as she may want, and as much of the household  
and kitchen furniture as she may think she wants together with those  
farming utensils and cattle that she may need, to be selected by herself  
or some friend whom she may chuse. Item I give to my daughter  
Rebecca & her husband's children One hundred & fifty acres of land the  
same that I have willed to my wife during her natural life, to my  
daughter Rebecca and her children after my wife's death, to her and  
her children that she now has or may hereafter have for their own use  
and benefit and not to be under the control of her husband, but the  
my daughter to have the whole control of the land during her life and  
at her death to be equally divided between all her children to each and  
equal share. Item I give and bequeath to my daughter Sally  
Kelly's children One hundred acres of land on the south end of my present  
tract to be laid off by my executors in a suitable form, to her my daughter  
and her children, and not to be controlled by her husband but she is  
to have the use or rent of this above hundred acres to manage as she  
wishes, and at her death, I bequeath the above hundred acres to her  
children, to each one equal share. Item I give to my son James  
Sodowsky's children, One hundred acres of land to commence adjoining  
the place where Mr. Cartmell now lives and to be laid off in a  
suitable form so as to include one hundred acres for him to occupy  
during his life and at his death to be equally divided between all his  
children alive at his death to each an equal share. I also give to my  
son James my negro man Abraham to be for the benefit of raising his  
children, but not liable answerable for the payment of his debts, the  
land is not to be taken from the children in any case to pay his debts  
but he is to occupy the land if he chooses to maintain his children

331. B. In case he does not occupy the land, the land and negroes to be rented  
& hired out to maintain his children, by my executors or if he should  
wish to move to a new country then my executors shall have power to sell  
and convey the land above named and to make a good and sufficient title  
by deed, and to lay the money out in a new country for land for his children  
and make the title of the land so purchased to all his children with liberty  
for him to occupy the same during his life on as much of the land as he  
may need for his own use to occupy. Item I give and bequeath to my  
daughter Susan Wrigley Twenty three Hundred dollars four hundred of which  
I have paid for a negro woman I bought for her, the balance of nineteen  
Hundred dollars, I give in the following manner, first it is my wish  
knowing that there is now several suits pending between thet & myself, John  
Hugh & James Sodowsky against Jacob Sodowsky for and James Sodowsky  
it is my will that out of the nineteen hundred dollars, I now propose to  
give my daughter, all the costs, judgments and all the loss & damage that the  
Wrigley's may recover of Jacob & James shall come out of my daughter Susan's  
part and this will shall be a sufficient voucher for my executors for paying  
the same and charging against my daughter's estate finally my son Jacob's  
sums are not less one cent by these suits, but whatever amount they have  
to pay is to be refunded as above either in damages or costs, the balance of the  
nineteen hundred dollars that I design for my daughter to make her equal  
with my other children, I give the interest as soon as it shall or can be just  
to interest, but if any unforeseen accident shall happen that she may be  
neglected for money to support upon during her life, then this money  
may at the discretion of my executors be laid out or paid in such way as  
they may think best during the life of the said Susan Wrigley and at her  
death she is to dispose of the balance that may be in the hands of the  
executors as she pleases. Item I have already given to my daughter  
Peggy (Dedrick) (Deed) four hundred dollars and it is my wish that her children  
shall receive what I intended for her, agreeable to my estimate there is yet nine  
hundred dollars to be given them, which I want to divide equal with  
them after deducting the money that may be spent in educating the small  
children by executors, the money to pay these legacies is to be raised by selling  
all my stock and perishable property and the hire of all my negroes not with-  
out my wife's death and then the sale of a small piece of land that I have not  
willed, and if this should not be sufficient to pay of the legacies then it is to  
be made up from the sale of my negroes after my wife's death to make these  
two legacies equal to twenty three hundred dollars each in the way above  
described. Item It is my wish that my son Jacob Sodowsky Jr. shall  
receive out of my estate the value of a small portion of land so as to make  
his quantity I give him one hundred and fifty acres at the real value of the  
land per acre for what may be different. Last it is my will & desire that  
after all my just debts are paid and all the legacies are discharged and after  
my wife's death that every species of property that is mine shall be sold and  
the amount equally divided between my five children children, that is each  
child to receive one part, and firstly as this my will I make and  
say and ordain that if any person claiming under this will or as my heir  
shall not stand to this will but shall go to law about my estate, then it is  
my will that they shall forfeit all their right and their share or shares shall  
be divided amongst the rest, and last of all I set my hand and seal this  
25<sup>th</sup> June 1830 It is my will and desire that my wife and my son Ephraim

In the name of God & Amen. Being far advanced in years and knowing from the course of Nature that I must shortly die, I make this my last will and testament. To my daughter Eleanor Lusk I bequeath forty acres of land to be taken from the tract on which I now live, to begin at a Burr Oak a corner commonly called Old's corner thence to the south line and with the south line of my tract until it strikes the Suckman road, thence with the road so far as will give the aforesaid quantity of forty acres by running a straight line from the termination of the road to the beginning at the Burr Oak. The balance of the tract on which I reside I bequeath to the lawful issue of my son John's body containing One hundred and one and a half acres more or less. To my son John's sons Samuel, James & John Thomas and William I give my tract of land adjoining the one on which I live and Nathaniel Welch on the West, James Fletcher on the South supposed to contain about One hundred and less acres more or less. To the lawful issue of my son John's body I give my slave Abram. To my daughter Eleanor Lusk I give my slave Phoeby together with her future increase in children. To the children of my daughter Nancy Watson deceased I give (David Watson, Hilly Smith and Polly Ann Watson) I give my slave for my Slave Jack having been faithful through many years service and more infirm and of little value, it is my wish after my death that he should be kept upon the home place given to my son John's children and compelled to labor only at such business as is suitable for his condition. To my son John's children I give my Waggon, guns and appurtenances and six head of horses, three doore mares, two hore a bay horse colt one year old and a bay filly one year old. The balance of my horses I give to the children of my deceased daughter Nancy Watson. To my grand daughter Dolly Ann Watson I give one cow the choice of my flock to be by her made. To my grand son William Old's I give one cow. All the rest, residue and remainder of my estate both real and personal I bequeath to the children of my son John Welch. It is my will that my trusty friend Daniel B. Price should take upon himself the execution of this will agreeably to the several bequests and devises herein made for which end and purpose I direct that he shall be permitted to qualify as my executor without giving bond security for the performance of the duties required upon him by law as such, as much as I have entire confidence in his integrity and that he will do whatever I have herein requested and directed from pure motives. In testimony of the foregoing three pages being my last will and testament I have hereunto set my name and affixed my seal this twelfth day of January 1832.

I give and bequeath to my wife Eleanor McCampbell one half the tract of land wherein I now live containing about two hundred & three acres, that is the one half the number of acres in said tract, to be laid off on the east side of said tract to adjoin the farm now owned by Lydia Young widow of Nathan Young and the division line to run through the property of the農場, and to continue its course east way so far as with best and each half, and return to the aforesaid boundaries of said tract east way by lines that may best suit each half so as to have an equal quantity and parts of the house in each side. Also one negro man named Harry his share of three horses out of my whole stock of horses, one third of all the cattle sheep & hogs and one half of the farming utensils that I may die possessed of during his natural life, on the following conditions, to wit, the land she is to have as long as shee to live on it and occupy it as her own, but not to rent or sell her interest in said land to any person or persons whatever except to my son Wallace McCampbell, as it is my will and desire that said land together with the Negro man Harry at the death of my said wife shall pass as a devise to my said son Wallace McCampbell. Also I give and bequeath to my wife Eleanor one negro woman named Nancy & one negro girl named Anna, all the household & kitchen furniture of every description that I may die possessed of, to her and her heirs forever. This is the last devise of 2 negroes Nancy & Anna and the furniture to dispose of as she may think proper. I do also give and bequeath to my daughter Anna Susan Young Brigg the sum of seven hundred and fifty dollars and no more, which I consider her equal share of all my estate both real and personal including what she has received heretofore, the whole to descend to her and her heirs forever. I do also give and bequeath to my son John McCampbell the several tracts of land wherein he now lives and has full possession of, upon his death and debts for the same heretofore due to me but now in his favor, which said tracts contains about 120 acres, also one other tract part of south of military survey on marble creek containing fifteen acres difference to my son George Bonnough for the same. Also one negro man named Peter one negro girl named Mary, to him and his heirs forever.

I do also give and bequeath to my son Wallace McCampbell, one half the tract of land wherein I now live. That is the balance of said tract not within my wife, and to be laid off agreeably to the division line designated in his will, also the other half reserved to my wife, after her death which will include the whole tract (at her death) supposed to be 200 acres, also one other tract of land (part of Nathalias military survey on marble creek) containing about twenty acres, which was purchased in partnership with James and others of the executors of Martin Morn deceased and the whole has been devised to said Brigg by said executors. Also one negro man named Tom, one negro woman named Rachel, one negro boy named Dick, one named George, and one negro man named Harry who is willed to my wife during his natural life and heretofore named as a devise to her at her death. Also all the balance of my estate of every kind and real & personal (not heretofore devised) that I may die possessed of, I leave to Susan Brigg her legacy of seven hundred and fifty dollars.
