In the name of God amen. I Joseph Chismen of the County of Jefferson and State of Kentucky being weak of body but of sound disposing mind and memory do make and publish the following to be my last will and testament for the distribution of the estate of which I am possessed. First, It is my will and desire that all my just debts be paid, as also all expenses attending my burial. Then second, It is my will and desire that my beloved wife Jane Chismen take the third of the farm and plantation whereon I now live, to be laid off to her on the east side of the Hickman road in any way she may choose, that she have her choice of two of my negro a man & a woman, also of those women named Polly and their increase if any I give to her also as many cows as she may think proper to buy for her support, she is further at liberty to retain as many hogs and sheep as she may think necessary for her support and the support of her family. She is also to have and retain her choice of three horses out of my stock, the Mignon and as much of the gear as may be necessary, also as many of the farming utensils, and as much of the household and kitchen furniture as she may think proper and necessary for the use and comfort of herself and family. Richard Moore gave unto my beloved wife two hundred dollars in money for her own proper use and disposal. It is my will also that my Wife have the use of the clock until her death at which time it is my will and desire that the whole of the property then remaining in her possession which I have given her except the third of the land and

The sum of money which I have given him be sold by my Executors hereafter appointed, and the proceeds of the sale be equally divided between my eight daughters. It is my wish that the three negroes and their increase be purchased by some of my family, in the lifetime of my son George Chasman. I gave and conveyed to him by deed two hundred acres of my land which was laid off on the west side of the Hickman road, which together with the other property which I had given to him, agreeably to a Book account which I have kept of the distribution of property to my children, I deem a full portion and therefore give to him heirs nothing more. Item I have given and bequeath to my son Lewis Chasman, one horse saddle and bridle, one negro boy named Patrick. Further give to my son Lewis two hundred and fifty acres of the tract of land and plantation on which I now live, to be laid off on the east side of the Hickman road, to have possession thereof when he shall marry or arrive to the age of twenty one years but not to have possession of the third part which is devised to his mother until after her death unless it is his good pleasure to give it to him sooner. It is my will and wish that my son Lewis be raised and have a good English education given him and the expenses to be paid out of my estate. If my son Lewis should die without issue it is then my will and desire that the land and other property which I have devised to him be sold by my executors and the proceeds of the sale be equally divided between my eight daughters or the heirs of their bodies. Item 4th. It is my will and desire that the balance of the plantation after my wife has taken her third part be rented out by my executors to the best advantage. It is my will, and my executors are hereby authorized to make sale of the one hundred acres of my land lying on the west side of the Hickman road and fifty acres to be laid off on the east of the tract adjoining Martin Mays land, my lot in and adjoining the town of Nicholasville, and all the rest of my estate both real personal not herein particularly devised or heretofore given to my children, and the proceeds of the sales together with the money arising from the rent aforesaid, the money which may be coming to me from my former estate, and the money which I may have on hand at my death, or which may be then due me (except the two hundred dollars given to my beloved wife) be placed by my Executors in one fund, and by them equally divided between my eight daughters or the heirs of their bodies, to wit: Jenny Miller wife of Joseph Miller, Polly McNeill wife of Samuel McNeill, Peggy Hill, wife of James Hill, Selby Bradshaw wife of Smith Bradshaw, Rebecca Miller wife of James Miller, Love Hogan wife of William Hogan, Nancy Bradshaw wife of John Bradshaw, and Hannah Campbell wife of John Campbell. And in as much as I have been unable in the gifts I have made to my daughters to make them all equal in value, one with another, which has always been my wish I have kept a Book of accounts, in which I have charged each with the advances made to them, and it is according to the proportion which those advances bear to each other, that I wish them to receive each their portion of the estate embraced in this my will so that they may be made equal, looking into view what they have received and what they are to receive. And to enable my Executors or such of them as may think proper to act to carry my intentions in this respect into full effect, I most earnestly desire that they may take for their guide the account Book aforesaid, and make division among my daughters of the estate advanced for that purpose, so that finally all shall be equal. It is further more my desire that the negroes which may be sold to be purchased in by the family unless they shall chuse to be sold to persons out of the family. And lastly I do hereby appoint Samuel McNeill William Hogan and Samuel Barkley Executors of this my last will and testament or such of them as my choice to qualify to carry the same into effect. In testimony whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal this eighth day of February in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and twenty six, hereby revoking all other wills by me heretofore written or signed.

The undersigned commissioners appointed by the Sepamino county court
to settle with the Executors of Joseph Christman decd. having attended to
the duties assigned them beg leave to report. We find that the Exrs are
chargeable with \$2680 32 1/2 balance in their hands on a former
settlement as per record. They have received since said settlement from
Virginia for rent of lands \$1909 81 1/4 making together the sum of
\$4640 14. It appears that the Exrs. have disbursed \$1563 63 1/2
in vouchers 1823 to 1839 inclusive and 1839. Add to this sum
\$217 78 the amt we have allowed them for their services being 5 per
