William Wynn being in a state of perfect sanity of mind and believing that he should not recover from his illness under which he was then labouring, wishes his property to be disposed of in the following manner: the four negroes lowest Eddy, Mary, Eliza and Mary the youngest Mary & Eddy are to be sold five head of horses being all to be sold stand hotel kitchen furniture with the exception of a fancy bedstead and furniture, Capboard ware and a fancy chair & slip stand which are left specially to Michael Wynn his wife; the farming tools also to be disposed of. The stock of horses and cattle in partnership with Chabourn Chandler, constituting of sixty one hogs and fifteen cattle to be fattened or fed as much as may be found necessary by said Chandler the partner of said stock on the crop raised in partnership between W. Wynn and said Chandler and then to be sold and the money to be divided between the parties Chandler Wynn or Wynn Agents; The remainder of the crop after keeping said stock is to be sold and the proceeds thereof divided between the Agents or the Agents representatives and said Chandler after the payment of the rent for the farm and other contingencies as aforesaid. The cattle purchased by Chandler in the Illinois for W. I have given to my daughter Mary Grulcher two horses in consequence of which she is to have forty dollars left at the last division of the estate. I have given to my daughter Martha Sued Holloway one negro man more than my other children for which she is to be deducted one hundred and fifty dollars at the last division. I have given my son John Holloway one horse more than my other children for which he is to be deducted fifty dollars. I now appoint my wife and Thomas, Robert, George, Spencer and Samuel, executors of this my last will and testament.
