degan being very sick and weak in body, but of
perfect mind and memory, blessed be God of all
mercies for his goodness to me knowing that it is
appointed for all men Once to die, And considering
the mortality of my body do make and Ordain
this to be my last Will and Testament.

1st I Give my soul to Almightly God who gave
it, and my body to be buried at the discretion
of my Executors. And as touching my Worldly
Goods, I do leave it in the manner and form following.

2^d I Give and bequeath my beloved Wife my
young Bay Horse, with his Saddle his Bit & his
body Bells, and also all my Household and
Kitchen furniture, with my spinning Wheel, with six
head of Milk Cows, with my best Shear, also all
my sheep and Hogs, and my two Work Horses, with
the present Crops, all which things are not to be
appraised, but to be kept for the support of the
Family, I also have to my Wife One hundred &
and fifty pounds, to her and her heirs forever.

I also have to my Daughter Margaret Forbes
the Negro Girl wholly, that she has now in

in possession, to her, and her heirs forever. I also have
to my son Hugh the young Gray Mare and mare Saddle
also Two hundred pounds in cash, to him and his heirs
forever. I also have to my son James, that Tract of
land lying on Charles River in Lincoln County, to him
and his heirs forever. I also have to my son William
One half of the Tract of land I now live on, that
first known, by the name of Nicks's Cabbins, to him
and his heirs forever. I also have to my son Benjamin
the Plantation I now live on, to continue, only to be in possession
of of One half the Improvements, when he arrives at
the age of Twenty One years and of the whole at his
Mother's Death, who is to have the benefit of said
Improvements to that, period for the support of the
Family, to the said Benjamin and his heirs forever.
I also have to my Daughters Ann, Nancy, Furschard
Catherine, One hundred pounds in cash each of them, to
them and their heirs forever, And the remainder of my
Estate after my debts is paid, to be equally divided amongst
all my Children & wife. And in case my Wife should
chose to Marry the property abovesmentioned not to be
appraised, except her Horse Saddle, bed and body Bells
is to be under the direction of my Executors, to be continued
for the use of the Children, until they arrive at
the age of Majority. I do also Constitute and
appoint my Wife with my trusty Friends William
Hamilton & Hugh degan, to be Executors &
